

Fredericton Made Great Effort at Campbellton—Marysville Overwhelmed by the Champions.

The results of the opening matches of the New Brunswick Hockey League are surprising, that at Campbellton because the Fredericton team with little opportunity to practice and none for team-work, so narrowly failed to win and that at Chatham because Chatham the 1920 champions ran away from Marysville.

Marysville at Chatham was without a goal-keeper Titus not going. Hanson made his first attempt in the net.

Coming Games.

Fredericton will meet the fast Bathurst aggregation at Bathurst tonight finishing foreign games except that at Chatham. Bathurst last winter was strong at home, but owing to the collapse of the rink-roof under snow had to play at Chatham.

Marysville will play its other North Shore games late next month.

Bathurst is slated to play Fredericton here next Wednesday and Marysville the night following. After those games are played the league standing will take on form which will indicate something.

KING'S COLLEGE HOCKEY TEAM TO WEAR WHITE

Extensive Schedule of Hockey Matches in United States—Team is Now in Training.

King's College Hockey players returned to Windsor December 27 to train for the proposed hockey trip to the States the first two weeks in January. Training was commenced before college closed under R. Parnell captain, and W. B. Morehouse, manager, and will be continued until the team is in readiness to leave on January 4th.

The schedules include games with Harvard University and Boston School of Technology in Boston; Dartmouth College in Hanover; Bowdoin and Bates Colleges in Maine and a game in Portland, Me.

It is expected the team will be entertained in Boston by the Canadian Club. Communication has been received by King's from University of Buffalo to play them.

T. Winter, who was voted centre palyer of the all intercollegiate team in the Maritime Provinces, will represent King's against Harvard. Winter is one of the best college hockey players in the Maritime Provinces today. Instead of wearing the old blue sweater with white K, King's will play with a white sweater and blue K. This is done so as not to confuse with other colleges, namely, St. F. X., who have the same colors.

CONFIDENCE MAN TAKEN BY AIRPLANE

New York, December, 28—A special despatch from Minneapolis to the Tribune this morning says:

"Machine guns of an airplane manned by members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and private detectives riddled a plane piloted by Joseph H. Gadbury, alleged confidence man, forcing him to land near Winnipeg and resulting in his capture. Minneapolis police learned today.

"Gadbury, wanted in Britt, Iowa, on a charge of forgery and obtaining money under false pretences, is held in Winnipeg jail.

"Establishing himself in Britt and promising farmers of that community to build an airplane factory, Gadbury obtained about \$18,000. He is also charged with passing worthless checks totalling \$1300, after which he started for Winnipeg in an airplane. He was forced to land near Emerson, Minn., near the border, where his ship underwent repairs. Meantime private detectives from Iowa were on his trail.
