CONVICTION LEGAL IN SPITE OF THAT FACT

Further Action in the Case of Whittier Kelly Threatened ---Interesting Prohibition Case.

Whittier Kelly of Kingsclear who was out on \$210 bail for violation of the Prohibition Act by having liquor in his possession appeared in the Fredericton Police Court this morning and acknowledged the offence. A penalty of fifty dollars' fine or three months in jail was imposed by Police

Magistrate's Statement.

In imposing sentence the magis-trate made a statement which placed Kelly's arrest in a new light. He said nat under the Prohibition Act Chief Finley acting as sub-inspector had no right to arrest the man for the mere fact that he had a bottle of liquor on his person. However, having been ar rested and brought before the court in whatsoever manner Kelly was liable to conviction for an offense under the Prohibition Act. Under the circumstances the officer would have no redress against a prisoner who resisted arrest successfully and got away from
