## SIR GEORGE FOSTER OUT OF RUNNING FOR LEGISLATURE

Sir Robert Borden is Maintaining a Sphinx-like Attitude on the Subject—May Get Out While the Going is Good—House of Commons Act to be Amended—New Premier Will Not Have to Seek Re-election.

Ottawa June 27—Special provision is made in the resolutions incorporating the increases in salaries and indemnities to premier, ministers and members by which the Premier can vacate his place in parliament and another minister take his place without the necessity of a by-election. At least that is the direct conclusion drawn from a careful scrutiny of the clause in question. It reads as follows: "That sections twelve and thirteen of the Senate and House of Commons Act be amended by adding the member of the King's Privy Council holding the recognized position of first minister to the list of officers mentioned therein which may be held without disqualifying the holder thereof from sitting and voting in the house of commons, any one of which may be resigned by the holder thereof and any other of which may within one month of the resignation be accepted by such holder without vacating his seat in the house of commons unless a new administration has been formed in the meantime and has occupied the said offices."

This clause opens the way for a reshuffling of cabinet positions if not a reorganization and it would permit Sir Robert Borden to step out and Hon. Arthur Meighen or another to step out and Hon. Arthur Meighen or another to step in without an appeal to the people. If this does not make it absolutely certain that the premier is going to step down from his high position it at least shows that the possibility is being very seriously considered. Members of parliament in close touch with Sir Robert Borden profess to be altogether at sea as to his intentions.

A few deny strenuously that he will resign, while others admit the very strong possibility that he may. Sir Robert himself maintains a sphinx-like silence on the matter except that he replied to one friend who put a point blank question to him more than a week ago that he was uncertain as to what his decision will be. The best informed opinion is that he will have his resignation ready at the caucus to be held during the present week probably on Wednesday if that is the day of prorogation, but that he may possibly remain if the clamor is great enough.

One claim with regard to the clause above quoted is that it simply makes a prime minister for the first time a cabinet position drawing a salary. Hitherto premiers have held some other position to which a salary was attached, but Hon. N. W. Rowell is president of the privy council, and something has to be done to place the premier in a position to draw his \$19,000 a year. However there is much more than that to it.

Sir George Foster is now out of the running for the premiership. He was favorite to time with Ontario members while Sir Robert was away, but he has faded away into the background since a younger and more energetic leader is demanded. If Sir Robert says he feels well enough it will be he, if he asks for a few months more to see how his health stands. A section is against giving him the time.

## CHICAGO FIRM FACES A TAX FRAUD CHARGE

Chicago, June 28—Speedy indictment and punishment for Chicago war contractors accused of fraud in the manipulation of income tax reports, was demanded of the Federal District Attorney today when government investigators reported that they found a shortage close to \$500,000 in the 1917 and 1918 reports of the Briggs and Turvis Company.

The aggregate fine for such fraud, if established, would be approximately \$800,000.

The Briggs and Turvis Company is a steel and iron concern which is said to have done a tremendous business during the war period. For some time government officials have been suspicious of the income reports officially submitted by the company. They began an investigation. While it was under way the secretary of the company, Albert I. Lauer, was arrested and indicted on the charge of attempting to bribe one of the investigators.
