OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

FASHIONS IN BRIEF

Linen hats for children are shown in unusual effects this summer.

Eyelet embroidery in metal—gold on cream muslin—is new and pretty.

Graceful trailing draperies are features of the newest foulard frocks.

The all black large transparent hat is a favorite for dress wear this summer.

Frilled skirt-blouses will be worn with tailor-mades; in fact, frills of all kinds are to be seen on houses and bodices.

One of the fall styles in blouses features a bolero or Eton jacket of embroidered Georgette worn over a taffeta or satin under-blouse.

The new tailor-mades are decorated with much braiding; and on some of the more attractive models the braids are wide, very supple and cleverly twisted into circles and scrolls.

Hats will still be worn straight back from the forehead, although the fashion of drawing it down in the shape of a half-moon on one side is considered smart. With an abundance of hair, it is piled at the highest point of the crown of the head in a soft mass, and held in place by tortoise shell pins.

'BUILT-IN' CUPBOARDS RETURN

The pressur of modern housing conditions has brought into favor the "built-in" furniture of old Colonial times, says the Toronto Globe.

Among these pieces found in many homes of the period were the corner cupboards placed in the dining-room. Some of these had open shelves and others were glassed in. For modern day usage they are admirable for showing off choice bits of china, prized for their associations, which are likely to get broken in an ordinary pantry.

For the small dining room the "built-in" buffet offers advantages. Space is saved and also the expenses of the costly buffet, which must be of good material and workmanship in order to be attractive.

Oak, ash or other expensive woods are usually advisable for the making of movable furniture, but any of the cheaper woods, such as pine and birch, can be used to advantage for the built-in pieces, and they can be painted to harmonize with the trimming of the rest of the room.

CANNED RHUBARB, PINEAPPLE

Remove the tough skin, also the eyes from the pineapple. Discard these and pick the meat from the hard core. Measure the pineapple, add cold water to cover and set to cook. Let boil slowly until tender; then add a layer or rhubarb cut in one-half inch pieces (there should be twice as much rhubarb as pineapple); then a layer of sugar; continue thus until fruit and sugar; have been used. About two and one-half cups of sugar for each quart of fruit. Let simmer until the mixture is brought to the boiling point throughout. Turn into sterilized fruit jars, put on new rubbers that have been dipped into boiling water, set covers in place half seal and process thirty minutes in water bath. Seal tight and when cool store.

STRAWBERRIES ARE PLENTIFUL

Meaford, June 26—The strawberry crop in Meaford and surrounding country this season is the largest within the past ten years. Growers are experiencing some difficulty in procuring boxes, in consequence of which no shipments have yet been made to outside points. The price has dropped to 20 cents a box, and it is expected that a day or two more will see a further drop to 12 cents. An outside buyer was here today and bought one grower's whole patch on the vines at 18 cents per box.

WILL PROBE MEAT PRICES

Boston, June 26—The recent advance of from 8 to 10 cents a pound in the price of meat in this city is to be the subject of investigation by Commission on the Necessaries of Life. Brig. Gen. Sherburne, chairman of the commission, set several of his agents to work yesterday. They will conduct their inquiry in conjunction with investigators of the Department of Justice.

London, June 26—Mary Pickford and Douglas Fairbanks are creating a sensation here. "I have long looked forward to visiting England," Miss Pickford told me. "My ancestors came from here. I seem


to have lived here before. I believe in reincarnation, and it seems to me I was here three hundred years ago as Mary Stuart.


