BUILT-IN' CUPBOARDS RETURN

The pressus of modern housing con litions has brought into favor the built-in" furniture of old Colonial imes, says the Toronto Globe.

Among these pieces found in many homes of the period were the corner cupboards placed in the dining-room. Some of these had open shelves and others were glassed in. For modern day usage they are admirable for show ing off choice bits of china, prized for their associations, which are likely to get broken in an ordinary pantry.

For the small dining room the 'built-in" buffet offers advantages. order to be attractive.

Oak, ash or other expensive woods are usually advisable for the making of movable furniture, but any of the cheaper woods, such as pine and birch, can be used to advantage for the builtin pieces, and they can be painted to harmonize with the trimming of the

CANNED RHUBARB, PINEAPPLE

Remove the tough skin, also the eyes from the pineapple. Discard these and pick the meat from the hard core Measure the pineapple, add cold water to cover and set to cook. Let boil slow ly until tender; then add a layer of rhubanb cut in one-half inch pieces (there should be twice as much rhubarb as pineapple); then a layer of GOLDWORK a Specialty 532 Queen Street, Fredericton, N. B. sugar; continue thus until fruit and sugar; have been used. About two and one-half cups of sugar for each quart of fruit. Let simmer until the mixture is brought to the boiling point through out. Turn into sterilized fruit jars put on new rubbers that have been dipped into boiling water, set covers in place half seal and process thirty minutes in water bath. Seal tight and when cool store.
