A LADY CAMPAIGNER.

The success of Mr. Asquith's campaign in Paisley was due in no small part to the very effective work accomplished on the stump by his daughter, Lady Bonham-Carter. According to English newspapers, she was a tower of strength to her father in the campaign, and undoubtedly secured for him many votes. Her style of oratory is shown by the following report of a speech which she delivered at a crowded and boisterous meeting of a Liberal club:

"When I first spoke to you I thought it only fair to point out some of the foibles and shortcomings of your candidate. (Laughter.) I did not dwell on his good points because I thought you might find them out for yourselves. (Loud cheers.) I think you have found them out. And I tell you this—if you will allow me to tell you anything about him now—that they are the sort of good points that grow on one. I speak from experience. (Laughter.) My connection has lasted just as long as my life. They have grown upon me all that time, and they are growing upon me still. I would give ten years of my life to win this election—the next ten years, not those between eighty and ninety. (Laughter and loud cheers.) If we do win—and I think we have won—(cheers)—it will be because of the wonderful loyalty the magnificent support, which you have given him."

In the Manitoba provincial elections a few years ago Mrs. Nellie McClung, a very clever writer and public speaker, took the stump against the Roblin-Rogers machine, and materially aided the Liberals in securing a victory at the polls. Now that women have the franchise, no doubt in future elections women are destined to play an active part in political campaigns. In the old days a man possessed of an abundance of this world's goods was looked upon as a most desirable sort of candidate, but in future the call will likely go out to the man who can boast a bevy of attractive daughters capable of taking care of themselves on the public platform. What possible chance would a candidate for political honors such as our old and esteemed friend, Commodore Stewart, ex-M. P. P., of Chatham, have against such a combination.

tinues to cling to office in defiance of recognized public sentiment—is not likely to initiate vigorous and progressive legislation. It marks time, frightened to march forward, unwilling to make way.

"But Canada has to face her present problems. On the threshold of the period of national reconstruction and adjustment which follows the winning of the war, with big and pressing issues to be dealt with, there is need for earnest, effective and efficient leadership. It cannot be anticipated from the disintegrating union ministry—that much the Speech from the Throne makes clear. The people must look to Parliament itself. The House will have to push the laggards along."

"The government apparently has no policy to lay before the people's representatives in relation to economic and industrial conditions, the pressing problem of mounting prices, the necessity for increased production, the serious increase in unemployment, the prevalence of profiteering, the need for progressive tariff revision. The House and the country will be interested to learn from the deliverance which the administration placed in the hands of the overn General that in its opinion "general conditions are, on the whole, satisfactory."

The railways do not appear to be doing very much to relieve the fuel shortage from which Fredericton is suffering at the present time. Of course they are having their own troubles, but this should not prevent them from making an effort to relieve the desperate conditions which exist in this city. There is said to be lots of wood along the Valley Railway and Canada Eastern line, but the owners find it impossible to obtain cars on which it can be shipped to the city. A little more loosening up on the part of the railways would be a good thing just now.

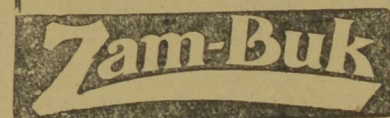

Voluntary Auditing

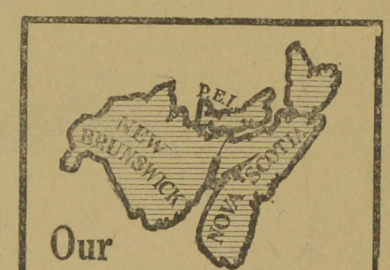

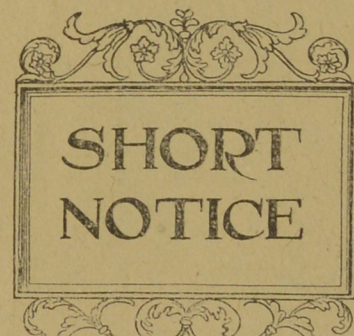
