## CABINET MINISTERS TOUR CENTRE OF PROVINCE

(St. John Telegraph)

Hon. C. W. Robinson and Hon. E. A. Smith, minister of lands and mines have returned after a trip to the central part of the province. They were accompanied by G. H. Prince, chief of the forestry department, on their tour of inspection of that part of the province which lies along the waters of the Tobique and Nepisiquit.

Leaving Plaster Rock on the morning of July 14 by automobile they followed the Tobique for thirty four miles to the forks. From this point the journey was made in canoes, up the Tobique forty miles to Nictor Lake, which is the source of the main branch of the Tobique. From that point the usual transfer was made overland about three miles to the Nepisiquit lake, which is the source of the main branch of the Nepisiquit and from Nepisiquit lake the journey was continued in canoes for sixty-two miles to the Grand Falls of the Nepisiquit, where there is a railroad used by the contractors, Morrow & Beatty, which connects with the C. N. R. near Bathurst.

G. H. Prince the chief forester made a detour from the forks of the Tobique by way of the Mamozakel overland, connecting with the party at the Nictor lake. This detour enabled him to visit the camps of the survey party which is at work in that territory this summer.

Some of the best of the crown lands of the province and of the haunts of the game are in this district. The minister of lands and mines was enabled to get first hand knowledge with regard to the condition of the forest, the ravages of the spruce bud worm, the suitability of this location for game reserve and the general conditions with regard to the game; also to better understand the merits of the arguments of some of the guides who are opposing the establishment of a game reserve in this locality. Game seemed to be abundant, particularly deer, and it seemed as if nothing could excel the Tobique river for salmon fishing and the Nepisiquit river and lakes above the falls for trout fishing. The whole trip was in charge of Bert Moore, head guide, who had with him as assistants three expert guides and canoe men.

At the great falls of the Nepisiquit an opportunity was afforded to inspect the construction work taking place at that point for the Bathurst Lumber Company. The contractors already have made good progress in the construction of the dam and towards the installation of the turbines which, it is expected, will develop a continuous supply up to 9000 h.p. for the use of the company and the public.

Old Santa Claus will not be the victim of profiteers this year, according to the statement of men who are to furnish supplies to him. These men, who are members of the American Association of Toy Manufacturers, have just held a meeting at Atlantic City, and they announce that prices of toys will not be boosted, but will remain about the same as last year.

The genial old gentleman pictured with long white whiskers, a dumpy figure, short legs, round belly and an everlasting smile was hard hit by the World War. His principal source of toys in pre-war times was Germany. The district around Sonneberg, Thuringen, alone furnished to him 24,000,000 playthings a year; from the Tyrol the Black Forest and Saxony he got wooden toys and wood carving; from Nuremberg magnetic floating fish and ducks, from Brandenburg tin cars, soldiers and cannon. But during the war nobody outside Germany wanted these German toys, and few persons could get them if they had wanted them.

America had not then begun to make the less expensive kinds of toys because it was cheaper to buy them from Germany than to manufacture them. As a result the toy supply for the first war Christmas was somewhat limited; it was not much better the second Christmas, despite the fact that the Japanese had endeavored to take the place of the German toy makers. In the end America started out to manufacture its own toys, and there is no longer a demand for those of foreign make. According to the toy makers, "Japanese toys do not compare with our output in durability or originality" and they say that while "it is probable that German toys are being brought into this country, the total is too small to be felt by the American producer."

In these hot summer days old Santa's workshops are busy preparing for the winter's holiday season. But they are turning out widely different toys from those they produced in war time. The "war note" is absent; there is no demand for tin soldiers, tanks, guns and cannon. The children of the world were the great sufferers from the war. It is no wonder they want no reminders of it.

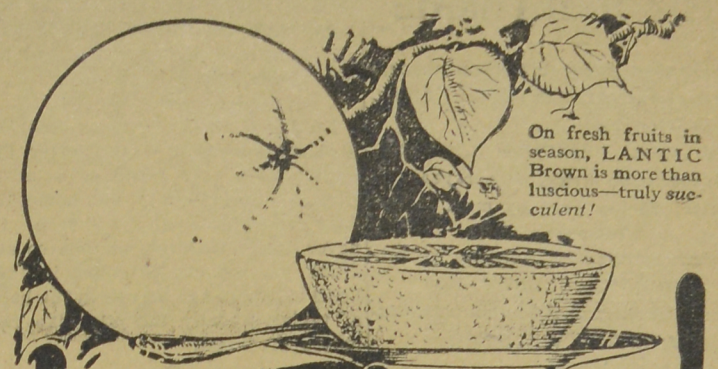

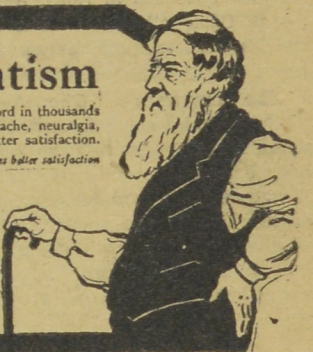
