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## OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

A RAINBOW SEASON OF COLOR

It was distinctly a season of many colors and women of fashion have apparently got away from the notion that there is something barbarian in the wearing of bright hues. There is really just as much opportunity to show good taste in wearing bright colors as bad taste. To be sure, if you have no color taste, then you are safe in keeping to dull or neutral hues.

Henna as such may be a back number, but there is the tone that the French call "brique" that is gaining increasing place in plans for autumn clothes. Especially smart is this "brique" when used with black trimming.

Many red shades are in favor, and you will probably hear more of Venetian red as the season advances.

There is a fondness for combinations of light summer shades, especially in organdie or chiffon. Blue and pink, blue and yellow, certain shades of lavender with yellow or lavender with blue are all good. In some of the French evening frocks chiffon of three or four of the light pastel shades is caught together to form a shoulder ornament or a hip or skirt drape.

Jade has been reported dead more than once, but it still seems to have enough of life in it to reappear in some very interesting combinations with black or white. There are some striking black silks with jade green stripes and some effective frocks have only just been brought out of jade green embroidered in white.

Gray, of course, is having things its own way in Paris. Often this is combined with pink in what might seem an insipid combination. Somehow it is used to appear very smart. Then it has been combined with trimming of black and red very effectively. This combination appeared once in a cloak of plain grey woolen material trimmed with other wool of black and red. Then again there was a costume consisting of a plaited gray silk skirt and a jacket made like a sort of Chinese mandarin coat of irish red silk embroidered in black.

"MAKE A NOTE OF IT"

A little kerosene added to the water in wiping paint or painted floors gives an artistic finish. Kerosene alone or in water or any good floor oil used as a cleanser for oilcloth once a week helps to preserve the floor covering.

Never blush a cobweb from a kalsomined ceiling. It will make an unsightly smudge. Take a duster of silk or fine cheese cloth and gently "flip" the cobweb away.

When cooking an egg that is cracked put a little salt in the water.

To enrich the coloring it is advisable sometimes to brown the flour before making a spice or fruit cake.

The Kilties are making the towns of the Chautauqua circuit in their private car. Their coming will be the event of the week.

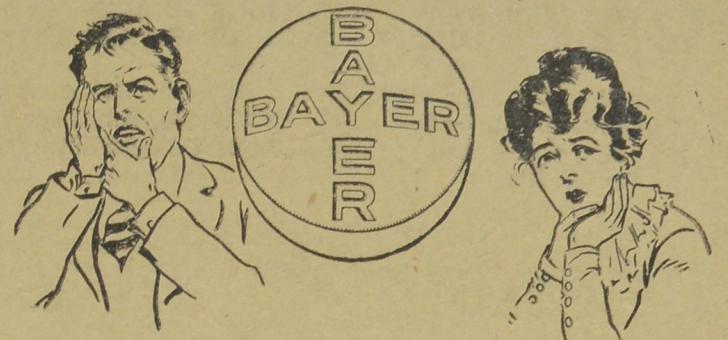
## REFERENDUM POSTPONED

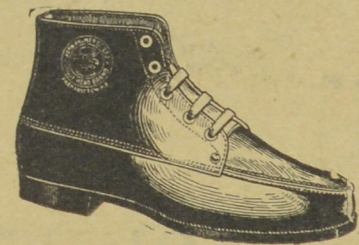

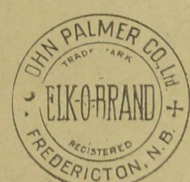
