

OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

JEWELRY UP TO DATE.

The New York Sun says:

Every woman nowadays recognizes the necessity of keeping her jewelry up to date as well as her clothes, since the modern woman realizes that her ornaments are part of her costume, and a very important part, as they often either make or mar it, according to her discrimination.

Many women bring their jewelry into mode by having valuable stones reset in the newest designs, of which this season notes the bowknot brooch among pins, though the barpin is still so fashionable as to be almost a requisite. In the latter there are many variations, but that of sensible usage is of all diamonds, for it harmonizes with all colors and with other gems provided that the settings are all matching. In fact, it is quite understood that no one may mix mountings, as gold and platinum, for instance, worn at the same time. Where a woman's means are limited it is permissible, should she so desire to use the barpin of brilliants or rhinestones as they are most often called other items of jewelry being of some very simple sort, such as artificial pearls.

The wrist watch is growing daintier in size, and of course is to be had in either the mere gold or of all gems. One recently presented to Mme. Joffre is not much wider than its ribbon. Pendant saintoir watches are very charming and so well designed that, worn with the face inward, as they are it is possible to use them with demi-toilettes as pure ornament. These are made of the all white diamonds or diamonds and sapphires or diamonds and emeralds. It is just a matter of taste which.

Naturally the short sleeved gown which now obtain even in street attire has brought the bracelet into pronounced vogue. Over the glove the band bracelet is chosen, and for the bare arms the flexible. Bangles are not found in noteworthy jewelry at the moment. The flexible bracelet is very frequently just the one row of all diamonds set in platinum, but with another bracelet of sapphires, rubies, emeralds or amethysts it may be brought into the fuller harmony of the apparel and so may also be kept in line with the parure; that is, the set of jewels which certainly wisdom dictates for the girl or woman who has only to decide what she wishes in order to have it. And as there are sixty million dollars' worth of precious stones mined annually there are, self-evidently, many such in the gay world of fashion.

For the quite young girl there is a slim strand shown of baroque pearls linked with gold. Baroque pearls are those which are irregular and of not such value as the round or pear shape, or in fact one or two other shapes which take precedence.

This year many of the handsomest gowns are adorned with real gems. Where the overblouse is open from under the arms to the girdle two diamond clasps are in order to hold it. A magnificent use of real pearls was made in a dress worn abroad recently; ropes of fine pearls were slung from the shoulder on the right hand side to the left side of the waist at the hip. Over the forehead was worn a band of pearls and under the chin from one side to the other another band of the gems was worn loosely.

For brides where the wedding veil is fastened in the under the chin strap mode, pearls are often worn opera length; indeed a tight string is almost impossible for the sake of appearance.

The wedding ring is in vogue in the carved gold a little more than hitherto. However, the plain gold band is not unfashionable for those who like it, and many do. In the carved rings narrow as they are in width, several designs are to be had, each flower of the month may be found and also orange blossoms as well as the entirely conventional. Where the circle of diamonds is selected it is in the closely placed jewels, or part way, or spaced, but these have never had the favor of the gold ring and probably never will. A novelty is an engagement and wedding ring in one; the engagement ring, which is jewelled is made with a band space into which the wedding ring inserts; when worn together the wedding ring does not show, but both are complete rings though the wedding ring is exceedingly dainty to be contained in the band space of the engagement ring.
