RUSSIAN PEASANTS ARE OPPOSED TO COMMUNISM

Discussion Over the Proceedings of the Third International Conference at Moscow—Peasants Said to be Longing for a Czar—Are Intensely Religious—Soviet Government Said be Well Established in Russia.

Copenhagen, Oct. 10—Much discussion has arisen over the published accounts of the proceedings of the recent Third International Conference at Moscow, and the new principles of Government and order as laid down by Lenin.

I have just had a talk as regards these matters with the only Danish delegate to the Moscow conference, Miss Marie Nielson, a teacher in a Copenhagen municipal school. She admitted that a secret resolution was adopted by the delegates after a brilliant speech by Lenin, but declared that she was bound not to reveal any of its contents.

Asked if she considered regicide justifiable under any circumstances, she evaded answering by remarking that it would probably not be necessary in other countries but Russia.

"One of the returned German delegates, Herr Dittmann, has stated that the Soviet government is having considerable trouble with the Russian peasants, who refuse to turn the land they have taken from the landed proprietors over to the State," I said, "Is this true?"

"Yes, it is quite true, and it is one of the most difficult problems Lenin has to solve. Immediately at the first outbreak of the revolution the peasants themselves took the initiative without waiting for Soviet instructions. They drove the proprietors out or killed them and took possession of their land. Now while they wish to retain Soviet government, they are strongly opposed to communism. Thousands of the younger generation are in the Red armies, fighting like lions to defend their possession of the soil."

"But how does the government expect to introduce communistic principles in the country districts when the peasants are opposed to them?"

"Lenin is convinced that as soon as the Soviet government gets the means of traffic and communication organized and is in a position to manufacture the industrial goods which the peasants need, it will be possible to control them. Even now Lenin has succeeded in making the peasants turn over their harvested crops to the Soviet government by supplying them with machinery and implements, and it is for this reason that it is absolutely necessary for him to reopen trade with England, Germany and the United States which alone are able to supply the agricultural implements needed to win over the peasants. With out the support of the peasants it is impossible for any government to maintain itself in Russia."

"Is it true that the peasants are longing for a Czar and that Lenin has not dared to inform them of the assassination of the imperial family?"

"Yes, to a certain extent this is true, but only because the Czar to the Russian peasants was not only the head of the state but also of their church. The peasants are intensely religious and the influence of the pope is still very great."

"How long do you think the Soviet government will last in Russia?"

"I am convinced it has come to stay. It is now so firmly established that it cannot be overthrown by any interior or foreign agency. It is of course, barely possible that Lenin and Trotsky

mean the same stage of evolution as Marat and Robespierre, who were themselves swept away by the revolutionary torrent, but they are wiser than their French predecessors. The moment all foreign attacks cease and no new counter-revolutionary plots crop up the dictatorship will vanish automatically, because communism first of all is a society without classes. During the short transition period of the dictatorship the individual must be suppressed for the benefit of Society as a whole but later on an anarchistic reaction will naturally fol-

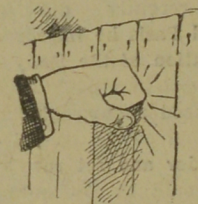
ANTI-DUMPING BILL WANTED

London, Ont. 10—As a result of extraordinary pressure by the largest British manufacturers, for a high protective tariff against United States commodities, particularly automobiles, Premier Lloyd George is giving the subject careful consideration. He has before him plans for introduction of an anti-dumping bill against Germany and this measure will be introduced as soon as parliament is reconvened.

Whether the Premier will commit himself to a protective policy against the United States is not indicated, but according to Godfrey Cheseman, general secretary of the National Union of Manufacturers, which represent billions of dollars of British capital. British manufacturers recently united in a strong plea to the Premier for such a policy the latter has not yet signified what action he will take in the matter, according to Cheseman. He said, however, that the Premier realized the importance of such a policy particularly as it affects the Anglo-American situation.
