THE LATE ELECTION

The St. John Standard tries to create the impression that Leader Baxter put up a wonderful fight considering the short time at his disposal. Leader Baxter himself in a published statement complains that the dissolution of the House caught the opposition unawares, as it was about to change its leader, and had little time for organization. Now what are the facts? The House was dissolved on the 16th of September and the election was called for October 9th. This gave the Opposition twenty three days to prepare for the contest. Now how does this compare with the action taken by Mr. Baxter's party in 1917? On that occasion they dissolved the House in mid winter, February 2nd, and fixed February 24th as polling day. The opposition of that day, instead of being about to change its leader, had no leader at all and did not name one until a week before polling day, and the gentleman selected was new to public life. Mr. Baxter's party had twenty members in the House when it was dissolved, while prior to the election of 1917 only two opponents of the government had seats in the House. Despite the short notice given and the great handicap of a midwinter campaign Hon. Mr. Foster in 1917, succeeded in overturning the government. In the late election Leader Baxter went to the country with nineteen members of the House at his back and came out of the contest with but twelve. Yet he now has the temerity to claim that the opposition made a splendid fight under the circumstances. As a matter of fact Mr. Baxter's party made a wretched showing at the polls. They captured but thirteen seats and even if it had been a straight party fight, there is not the slightest doubt that the government with the exception of Carleton, would have carried every constituency which on Saturday, returned Independent candidates. Mr. Baxter's party made a poor showing and it is not to be wondered at.

In only three counties of the province, viz: York, Albert and Restigouche did Leader Baxter's party elect full tickets in Saturday's election. Although Leader Baxter visited Restigouche and made a speech, which according to the Standards report, attracted people from all quarters of the universe, the combined vote of the two Liberal tickets was almost double that of Leader Baxter's candidates. Yet the opposition press has the temerity to claim that Mr. Baxter's party outvoted the government on Saturday.

Mr. H. J. Logan, president of the Maritime Board of Trade in a speech at Moncton last week said he knew of two manufacturers in this province who had recently been approached and offered inducements to remove their plants to Quebec. Cheap power was one of the principal inducements held out to them. There is no doubt that cheap power will do much to assist New Brunswick in holding its present industries, and will encourage the establishment of new ones.

The United Farmers of Carleton are certainly to be commended for having got wise to B. Frank Smith's little game in the late election. When he saw the storm coming, he threw his colleague W. S. Sutton overboard, and decided to go it alone as an independent with the hope that he might slip in on personal votes. There were two Smiths running in Carleton and the electors wisely decided that the one without political sins was the best fitted to represent the county.

The temperance issue seems to have been hurled down stairs and kicked out doors in the late election. After the plebiscite of last July a great deal was heard of the wonderful work on behalf of the cause that had been accomplished by the women. Here in Fredericton practically the same organization of women worked tooth and nail to elect three men who refused to pledge themselves to vote for a referendum to put a stop to the importation of liquor.

Our old friend Mr. Pinder appears to have been a victim of the agrarian movement in his home parish. It seems fortunate for the old gentleman that he had his friend Col. McLeod on the job for him at Williamsburg, Woodlands, McNutt's Mills and other centres where the Irish question is a live issue. The Parish of Southampton

told Mr. Pinder by almost a two to one vote that his services were no longer required.

Halifax Chronicle: The presence of a "group" in the New Brunswick Legislature will not be as disconcerting as it would be in some other Provinces. That sort of thing is not altogether a novelty. The New Brunswick Opposition had 26 candidates in the field. They elected 13. In a straight fight apparently the Government would have had a walk-over.

Although the provincial election was brought on at short notice, the opposition had plenty of time to raise a big boodle fund. Many people are naturally wondering where the money came from and how much certain interests which are determined to throttle the farmer movement subscribed to the fund.

Opposition papers may gloat over the defeat of Hon. J. F. Tweeddale in Victoria, but all the same he was a good Minister of Agriculture, who thoroughly understood the farmers' needs and it may be a long time before the province gets another as good.

The lone Acadian elected to support Leader Baxter might prove a useful member of the party, providing he is brought to Fredericton and placed under the tutelage of some of the Conservative ladies who were so active in the late campaign.

Although the religious question was a live issue in Fredericton at the recent election, strange to say many of the stalwarts who spent the day rushing in votes for the opposition candidates, seldom see the inside of a church.

Credit for the success of the Opposition ticket in York should be given to Col. McLeod, M. P. and the Conservative ladies of Fredericton, Williamsburg, Woodlands, Hamtown and Brewer's Mills.

Mr. L. P. D. Tilley told the St. John convention which nominated him that he had decided to retire from public life, but had changed his mind. He will probably now carry out his original intention.

Col. McLeod, M. P. should feel highly gratified to think that his strenuous effort in the late campaign saved the day for his ancient enemy Mr. Pinder.

The loquacious Frank Potts rung in at the foot of the poll in the St. John city election. The great trouble with Mr. Potts was that he talked too much in the House and said too little.

Mr. Pinder put it over Mr. Young at the Temperance Vale poll at a 2 to 1 shot and Mr. Young polled six more votes there than Mr. Hunter.

It was made clear by Saturday's election that as a political factor the N. B. Temperance Alliance does not count for much.

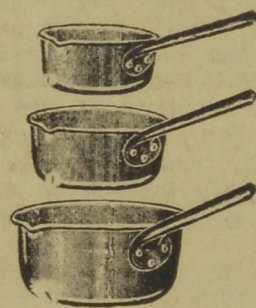
