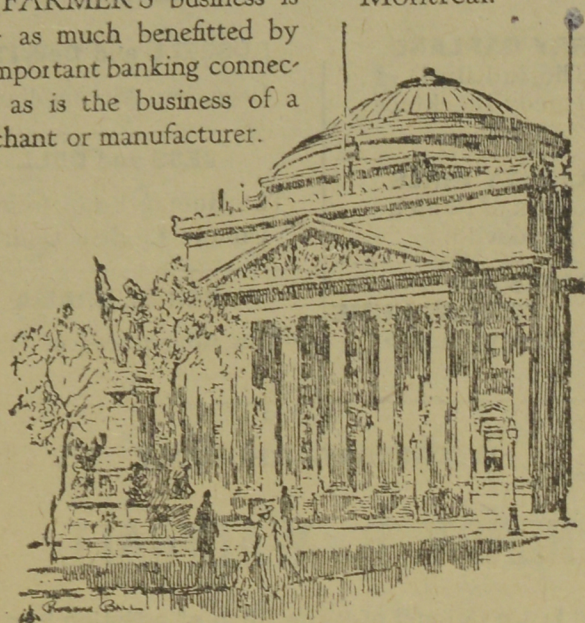

## HON. MACKENZIE KING WAS GIVEN A WARM WELCOME

Camrose, Alberta. — Camrose has broad streets and a broad mind. It's welcome to the Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and his party when they arrived here this morning was in no way partisan or political.

It was a community welcome which was extended to the leader of the Opposition and his colleagues. Flags were flying on the public buildings, and as the train pulled into the depot the town band struck up the strains of "O Canada."

The mayor and members of his council, the president and members of the Board of Trade, representatives of the clergy of the town, all were there to greet Mr. King as he stepped from his car.

There was a fleet of autos in attendance, and the party with their hosts were taken for a drive for several miles through the fertile farming country surrounding Camrose before being brought back to partake of an excellent luncheon as guests of the Board of Trade.

The official speech of welcome was delivered by Frank Layton, secretary of the Board and Conservative candidate for the local riding.

Hence the party was carried to the Normal School where several hundreds of bright-faced pupils of that institution and from high school and public schools of the town gathered to listen to Mr. King.

Then followed the big event of the day.

The evening meeting which attracted such an immense audience from the town and from surrounding country that, after the theatre was full to suffocation, the doors of the Methodist

Church were opened and an overflow audience short address from the Liberal leader, and from the Hon. J. R. Boyle, attorney general of the province and William Duff, member for Lunenburg, N. S.

At the theatre, Mr. King was supported by W. H. White, M. P., for Victoria, in whose constituency is Camrose, and E. A. Lapointe, M. P., who conveyed to the citizens of Camrose the message of the east and interpreted it for the west in terms of national unity.

Following the two crowded meetings Mr. King and his party were the guests of the ladies of Camrose and district at a reception and supper.

### Whole-hearted Reception

The whole day, with its many events crowded into less than twelve hours, was notable for the community enthusiasm which was evinced, and for the manner in which Camrose citizens, male and female, forgot sectional or party differences and joined together to welcome their distinguished visitor.

There was a real breath of the west throughout the proceedings and this prosperous and fortunately situated little town has given the leader of the Opposition a present invitation in the whole-hearted western manner, more intimate here and perhaps more significant than the overwhelming reception which greeted him at Edmonton.

## WHIPPING POST FOR PROFITEERS IN HUNGARY

(The London Daily Mail, Cross-Atlantic Cable.)

Budapest, October 10.—A considerable drop in prices and a notable increase of goods offered for sale are the first results of the Hungarian Profiteering Act, just become law. Flogging is one of the penalties prescribed for violation of the Act which is one of the most drastic pieces of legislation of its kind in the world.

Profiteering, as defined under the Act, consists, among other things, in buying and selling above maximum price; sharing more profits than customary; offering lower wages to a man than those laid down; speculation in foodstuffs and trying to make a "corner."

Possible penalties for violation include five years imprisonment; \$100 fine; flogging—five to twenty-five strokes; loss of political rights and trading license; and notice of the offense to be shown in the shop for six months.
