### A CARELESS PREACHER

The other day a news report of a sermon delivered by the Rev. Dr. Leonidas Robinson in the Fourth Avenue Methodist church, Louisville, quoted the learned doctor as saying:

"Fewer than one per cent. of all the men listed in Who's Who in America have a college education, and of these, more than half, or about one per cent of the men prominent in this country are doing the work that counts."

From which he deduced that:

"An eager quest and a correct taste for good books is better than the curriculum of any university."

A Buffalo paper lost no time in taking the matter up and here is what it says:

"We twitted a young college man about it, and he rushed into vehement defense of his new and shiny Master's degree. He took the bait, and did some work for us we never should have had patience to do for ourselves. He went through representative sections of the book, at random, and by a process of computation discovered that the ratio of college men to men of less formal education is as five to one in the 1920 volume of Who's Who in America, roughly speaking, 20,000 college men and women to 4000 others."

"This is interesting, but, as we told our young Master of Arts, we don't know exactly what it proves."

### THE COLLAPSE OF A REVOLT

Toledo Blade: When half a million workers seized metallurgical plants in the district of Milan, took possession of the military arsenal at Venice and confiscated mills in other parts of Italy that country seemed on the verge of a general conflagration.

Revolution seemed imminent and the Communists looked upon the coup as the beginning of soviet rule. But two important developments were unforeseen. The first was that although they held the manufacturing plants they were powerless to operate them because they could neither obtain raw materials nor induce the technical staffs to cooperate. The second oversight was the unexpected attitude of the Italian government, which maintained neutrality and refused to allow the military to be used against the workers. The revolutionists found themselves in possession of plants that were of no earthly use to them and the very fact that the government made no move to dislodge them by force took all the wind out of their sails.

The result was the collapse of the industrial revolt, thus proving once again that there are more ways than one of skinning a cat.

### WHY WORRY OVER JAZZ?

A new song asks, "What Cha Gonna Do When There Ain't No Jazz?" A variety of answers might be made if there was any immediate likelihood of jazz vanishing from the face of the earth. Ragtime music has been with us many years and it seems in no danger of losing its popularity. Jazz is a development of ragtime and it has spread from America to the far corners of the world. European nations are said to be passionately devoted to the sob of the saxophone and the clang, clatter and bang of the other instruments that produce jazzy renditions. There are few signs of the jazz market being swamped. There will be time enough to worry about what we are going to do "when there ain't no jazz" when there is some indication that the days of jazz are over. Quite likely something else just as good—or as bad—will take its place.

### INARTICULATE CONTENT.

Thomas A. Edison says the office worker is well satisfied with his lot because he understands the problems of his boss and is content to see the latter paid \$50,000 a year because he is close enough to know that the highly paid man earns his money. Office workers will appreciate Mr. Edison's tribute. It is true that close contact with high salaried officials causes men to appreciate the value of high

paid services. Just the same Mr. Edison is in error when he assumes that white collar workers are satisfied because they are inarticulate. No class of employees have been so hard put to it to make ends meet during the past few years. What Mr. Edison mistakes for satisfaction is really hopeless inability to express their grievances.

Calgary Albertan: The people who blame moving pictures for inspiring much of the spectacular crime of the day forget that there was the same kind of crime before the kinetoscope was discovered. 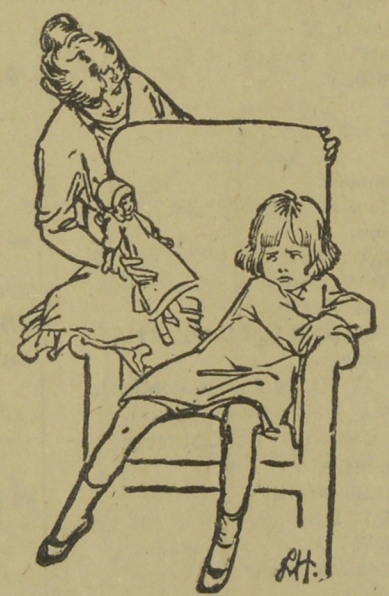

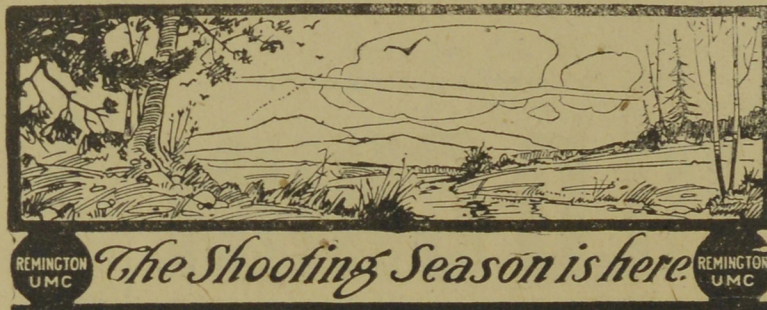
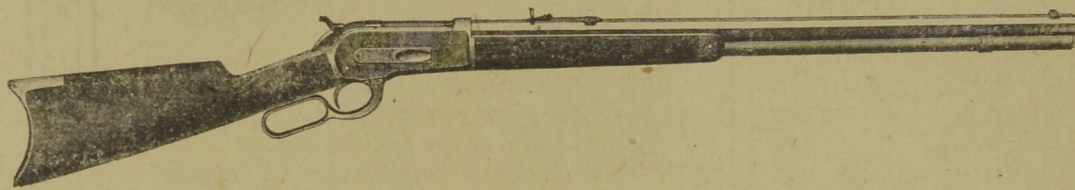
