LOWELL BELLE GETS DIVORCE  
FROM THE DASHING CAPTAIN

Boston, Nov. 21—A divorce which was granted yesterday afternoon by Judge Bell to Mrs. Mary Mitford from Capt. Roland Mitford, now in the British Army in Egypt, for cruel and abusive treatment and intoxication, ends a romance which began in France during the war.

Mrs. Mitford who was Miss Huntton of Lowell, a young woman of remarkable beauty, after graduating from the Conservatory of Music, went to Europe to complete her musical education. Her companion on the ocean voyage was Mrs. Alice Cram, a sister of ex-Lieut. Gov. Edward P. Barry. She was the Democratic candidate for Auditor at the State election.

When France was reached the war was already on. Not long after her arrival she met Capt. Mitford, son of an English writer. After a brief courtship they were married at Ostend.

Two days after the marriage Mrs. Mitford says she realized that her husband was a heavy drinker, brandy and soda being his regular beverage. She had only been his wife for 48 hours when her husband, while drunk she says, stood her up in a corner of their room and told her he would show her how Englishmen treated their American wives when it became necessary to imbue them with proper respect and convince American women that Englishmen were entitled to make subjects of their wives.

A reconciliation followed this incident and the Mitfords, accompanied by Mrs. Cram, went to England. A month later, while living at the Sussex Mansions, Mrs. Mitford told Judge

Bell, her husband drank a quart of raw brandy one morning before breakfast, and standing her by a window declared that both were going to plunge out together.

Mrs. Mitford succeeded in averting the threatened tragedy. The family physician was called, and, in reply to an inquiry by Mrs. Mitford, said that there was no trace of insanity in the Mitford family, but plenty of alcoholism.

Mrs. Mitford then separated from her husband and lived with his father until his death. She nursed the senior Mitford during his last illness, and said that her husband did not attend his father's funeral.

Mrs. Mitford decided to engage in war work and went to the battle line in France. She was wounded by a shell, and was awarded the Victoria Cross. Through efforts of Senator Lodge Mrs. Mitford obtained passports and returned to America.

Ex-Lieut. Gov. Barry informed the court that Capt. Mitford had written a letter saying that he did not desire to contest his wife's libel.

The Halifax city council has voted against going further with the federally-aided housing scheme. A majority of the aldermen voted that way on the assumption that the scheme was economically unsound. The federal aid so far accepted for housing amounts to \$200,000 and as a result of the expenditure twenty houses have been built and loans have been made on thirty others which are being built in various parts of the city.

P. E. I. MEN  
AMONG VICTIMS  
OF DROWNING

Bangor, Me., Nov. 21—The identification of most of the victims of the drowning accident at Lake Chesuncook on Thursday afternoon, discloses that several residents of the Maritime Provinces lost their lives among the sixteen woodsmen who perished by jumping into the water when the Great Northern Paper Co's motor boat No. 12 caught fire from an explosion of gasoline. Four of the drowned men

belong in the same place, namely Northam, P. E. I., nineteen miles west of Summerside. Their names are John Gorrie, P. C. McCaull, John McDowell, and Austin O'Connor. The bodies of all the Prince Edward Island men except that of Gorrie were recovered and will be forwarded to Prince Edward Island tomorrow. It is thought that several other provincialists may have perished, as most of the party were

unknown to the Great Northern officials except by number, and several large parties recently came to Maine from the provinces, including two cars of lumbermen from the island.

A partial list of the survivors is: Harry Walsing Lawrence, Mass., Alexander Joissigla, William Warakman, Alexander Ford, Thomas Walker, James O'Rourke, John Roudance, Frank Douski, Frank Mamnask, Paul Zommeusk, Boston, Philip Smith, Raymond Andros, John Mitchell, Knut Hellstrom, Al Jordan, Alec Gunn, Nelson Smith. Several of the men give their addresses as Bangor but they merely hired here, having worked in other parts of New England and Canada during the past summer and fall.
