COLONIZATION

In delivering the inaugural address at the sixth National Exhibition of Chemical Industries held recently in New York, Col. J. S. Dennis, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, pointed out that Canada had the greatest field for development on the North American continent, and that the United States, the richest country on earth was practically the only place in the world that can supply the elements Canada needs most.

Colonel Dennis emphasized that Canada has the greatest railway mileage per capita in the world; that 17 per cent. of the world's supply of coal is north of the international border; that it is abundantly supplied with natural gas, gold, silver, nickel, copper, iron and other minerals. Only through the co-operative action of the United States is Canada to convert her natural resources into wealth. A great deal of scientific research has been carried on during the past few years and much more is to be done. This is of particular interest to Canadians. He added:

"Colonization is Canada's most important problem today. Colonization means not only the obtaining of farmers to cultivate Canada's vast unoccupied areas of good agricultural land but the increasing of her population by the immigration of desirable citizens who will undertake the development of all her other natural resources by providing the necessary capital and labor. Development is not possible without additional capital and labor, and those can only be provided through the medium of increased population obtained by proper immigration and colonization efforts."

WAGES AND PRODUCTION

The public has declared a strike against high prices and one of the immediate results has been a lengthening of the lines of unemployed.

Manufacturers are unable to make and sell goods at a price the public is willing to pay and at the same time give their employees the wages that have been prevalent for the last few years. There is one way out. Manufacturers could pay the present rate of wages and sell at figures attractive to the public, if the workers would increase their productivity per man. Production per worker fell steadily during the era of prosperity, but as long as the public was willing to buy at proportionately higher prices the process could go on indefinitely. Now it is different. Low production, high wages and low prices do not jibe.

Intelligent workers are beginning to realize that increased output per human being is the only key that will unlock the door of fat pay envelopes and small grocery bills. Until the mass of wage earners learn the lesson, unemployment is likely to be common.

EATING AND HEALTH

It is a common report that more persons die of over-eating than of under-eating. Irish hunger strikes have astonished the world by showing that men can live without food for very long periods. Now comes the theorists to preach a general reduction in the human ration. That sort of thing may cause immense harm by cutting down the supply of food for children on the part of faddist parents.

President Herrick of Girard College, says that since a small midforenoon lunch has been given to the three or four hundred younger boys at the College there has been a marked decrease in the number of hospital cases. Minor ills, such as colds, are avoided apparently by well-filled stomachs. The Federal by election in East Elgin, Ont., yesterday resulted in the return of S. S. McDiarmid, the United Farmers' Candidate by a majority of nearly 200 in a three cornered fight. The government candidate stood next in the poll. The result is a bad black eye for the Meighen government and indicates that at the next election it will get little support from rural Ontario. East Elgin has hitherto been looked upon as a Conservative stronghold and at the last election elected Mr. David Marshall by a large majority. Both Premier Meighen and Hon. Mr. King took a hand in the fight.

Ottawa Record: Mr. King's tour of the west, now drawing to a close, has been a series of triumphs. Everywhere men and women have flocked to hear him. Liberals in the west are getting together. Old friends temporarily parted from the Liberal party, are coming back. Again and again Mr. King has emphasized the folly of division among the progressive forces of the country, and the need for unity in order to defeat Mr. Meighen and his gang of usurpers, and to restore representative government in Canada.

The great victory won by the Farmers' candidate in East Elgin, Ont. yesterday, is said to have created gloom in government circles at Ottawa. The loss of this old Tory constituency, is certainly a cold crack for the Meighen government and indicates quite clearly what is going to happen at the next election. Ottawa despatches have indicated that the government may soon appeal to the people, but if Premier Meighen is wise he will put off the evil day as long as possible.

The Federal by election in Yale, B. C. yesterday resulted in the return of Mr. McKelvie, the government's candidate by a majority of about two hundred. The Liberal Standard bearer was Col. Edgett, D. S. O., who was endorsed by the farmers and returned soldiers. He made a good fight, but the odds against him were apparently too great.

In 1917 the constituency of Yale, B. C., returned Hon. Martin Burrill by acclamation. In 1917 he had a majority of 1889. Yesterday the successful government candidate had a majority of less than 200 over the farmers candidate running with endorsement of the Liberals.

In the election of 1911 the farmers of Ontario were bamboozled into voting against reciprocity with the United States, but it looks as if they had since got their eyes opened.
