LIBERALS ARE LEADING IN PACIFIC PROVINCE

Provincial Elections Held in British Columbia Yesterday—
Liberals Carry Four Seats in Vancouver and Three in Victoria—Returns from Rural Constituencies Slow in Coming In—George Black Defeated in Vancouver.

Vancouver, Dec. 1—With election returns from nearly all the ridings in the province still far from complete at 8.30 p. m. (12.30 a. m. St. John time) the Liberal candidates in many of the constituencies appear to be in the lead with their Conservative opponents close up.

Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, has been elected in Uanaimo. Whiteside, Liberal, New Westminster, is elected by 382 majority and Anderson, Liberal, in Kamloops, has a good lead. Four Liberal candidates in Vancouver appear at this hour to be leading with the Conservative candidates polling a strong vote. In Victoria three Liberals and one Conservative are leading. Dr. Rose Conservative, is elected in Nelson by over 400.

N. B. Men Leading

Vancouver, Dec. 1—Four Liberal candidates are leading in this city. Mrs. Ralph Smith, Liberal, heads the poll, with MacKenzie, Farris and McDonald, and Hon. W. J. Bowser, Conservative leader, following. Worden, Conservative, and Ramsey, Liberal, are close for sixth place. Six were to be elected.

PROVINCE TO BE ASKED FOR \$50,000

Delegation from U. N. B. Senate to Wait Upon Provincial Govt. Tonight—Memorial Campaign.

The special meeting of the Senate of the University of New Brunswick which was decided upon at the regular meeting of that body in November will be held here tonight.

The special session is for the purpose of considering further the proposal for a campaign to raise funds for the construction of a convocation hall as a War Memorial. It is proposed that the sum of \$250,000 be raised for the purpose.

To Wait Upon Government

Tonight a delegation consisting of the Senate as a whole will wait upon the Provincial Government and ask that the province give one fifth of the total aimed at. This is what was done by the Provincial Government of Quebec during the autumn in connection with the campaign of McGill University for five million dollars.

WAGES OF LUMBERMEN CUT DOWN

Bangor, Me., Dec. 1—A new scale of wages to be paid for labor in the Maine woods by the lumber companies and pulp wood men went into effect today by agreement among the leading men and concerns in the business in Bangor and throughout this section. A cut was made a few days in Aroostook county in common labor in the woods from \$90 to \$52 a month. Many provincialists are affected.

The wages now offered for woodsmen will be \$2.50 per day and board when day work is carried on and \$3.50 per cord for cutting pulp wood. The previous scale has been \$3 and \$3.50 per day and \$4 per cord for pulp wood. Many men are now in Bangor hanging about the employment agencies and there is no trouble in getting all the help required.

A Bangor employment agent who was in communication by telephone with a Boston employment office on Tuesday was advised that labor is plentiful there, 500 men having been in the office on Tuesday looking for work.

The Lincoln Pulpwood Company discharged 100 men today, having finished cutting operations, and other concerns will be in a position to release many men soon, cutting operations being about completed.

BUTTER IS CHEAPER

Montreal, Dec. 2—At the local butter auction held today by the Quebec Agricultural Cooperative Society, at the Board of Trade, the total offerings were 734 boxes of butter and from these the following sales were realized: No. 1 butter, 364 boxes at 46½c lb; pasteurized, 176 boxes at 48½c lb; 194 boxes of No. 2, were offered and 45 cents asked, but no sales were recorded; No. 1 butter shows decline of 2½ cents since last auction.
