SKIRTS TO STAY SHORT—FOR SPRING ANYHOW

Suggestion of More Fullness, However, Is Approved Style—Individuality Keynote.

Cleveland, Nov. 27.—The semi-annual meeting of the National Cloak, Suit and Skirt Manufacturers' Association here today was attended by more than 300 delegates, who discussed the new fashions for spring, as displayed by living models at the style show this afternoon.

No very radical changes are shown from the lines of fall and winter garments. Skirts continue short and straight. The slender silhouette predominates, and the youthful spirit was expressed in many garments shown. "Individuality is the keynote of early spring apparel," said Philip Frankel, Executive Secretary of the association.

A wide choice in suits was displayed in straight, boxy jackets and closer fitting suit coats, with ripples at the sides and flat hanging panels front and back. Eton and bolero models give new effects with scallops, uneven hems and coat edges. Tailored suits, with and without belts, are cut severely slender. Skirts are short, with a suggestion of more fullness; in some cases with panels, tunics hem trimmings and pleatings.

JUVENILE MODELS.

For the boarding-school girl there are middies of bright red flannel, gay and cheerful garments made in the correct middy fashion, with deep shoulder yoke, tailored stitching, embroidered sleeve chevrons and flowing silk tie. All the girls are wearing these warm, comfortable flannel middies this year, and one may have a middie of blue flannel or of emerald green flannel, as well as of scarlet flannel. The flannel used is very soft and fine, and these gay middies are worn over skirts of white or tan linen for autumn sports.

LAMP SHADES YOU CAN MAKE

The lamp shades of today are expensive luxuries to buy, but any woman can afford to have a shade that would sell for a high price, if she is willing to pay for it in time and effort instead of dollars and cents.

Begin by studying your lamp and thus determine what size and shape of shade its height and contour demand. Of course a lamp may look well with shades of more than one style, just as you yourself find it possible to wear hats of different shape; but there are two general rules governing height and diameter which will be found of great assistance in arriving at a decision.

They are as follows:—

1. The bottom diameter of the lamp shade should approximately equal the height of the exposed portion of the lamp.
2. The height of the shade including fringe, if used, should be approximately two-thirds of the height of the lamp. Note that the latter does not include the electric bulbs and sockets but only that part of the lamp which properly should be exposed when the shade is in position.

BRITISH NAVY A PEACE FACTOR

DOUGHTY WAS KIDNAPPED OVER THE U. S. BORDER

Detectives Who Took Him Into Custody in Oregon Had No Warrant—Prisoner Came Along Voluntarily But was Arrested as Soon as He was Landed on Canadian Soil at Windsor, Ontario.

Windsor, Ont., Nov. 28.—Austin Mitchell, detective sergeant, crossed the border this morning from the United States into Canada with Jack Doughty, who is charged with the kidnapping of his employer, Ambrose Joseph Small, who disappeared December 2, 1919, the day he had received \$1,000,000 in cash as first payment for his string of sixty-one theatres.

The detective who has been travelling from Portland, Ore., across the United States as the virtual kidnapper of his prisoner, having no warrant or authority for holding him, smiled happily as the Michigan Central train crossed to Canadian soil.

"And now Mr. Doughty," said he, "you will pardon me if I cease to be your host and become your jailer. Heretofore you were very willing to go voluntarily to face a serious charge. But now you are a prisoner. I serve you with this warrant charging you with the kidnapping of Ambrose J. Small."

"The old sod never looked so good," said Doughty. "I'm glad to be over with a year of fugitive hiding. It was hell. I want to see my babies."

Gives No Reason for Flight
Doughty preserves the same apathetic attitude that has characterized his demeanor since his arrest. For two hours he was grilled by Sergeant Mitchell and Windsor police officials. When asked why he so precipitately fled Canada deserted his two children and took refuge in the remote village in the West under the alias of Carroll, he said: "Oh, reasons of my own. They'll come out in time."

"You know that you are suspected of the kidnapping and perhaps of the murder of Mr. Small?"

"Yes, by my enemies."

"When did you last see him?"
"The evening of the day he disappeared, but I last saw him two hours before others saw him alive. I have an alibi for that two hours. I was with my family."

"But you left for Montreal that evening."

"Yes, to take a new position that Mr. Small had got for me in Montreal."

"Why did you fail to send even your sympathy to Mrs. Small after that?"

"It was nothing unusual for Mr. Small to disappear. He went to the races and to the States for parties and remained away weeks at a time without our knowledge of his whereabouts."

"You drew \$100,000 in bonds from his safe deposit box the morning of the day he disappeared."

"Yes, and gave them to Mr. Small."

"You never mentioned that until Mrs. Small accused you of it twenty-six days later?"

"I had no occasion to mention it."

"Then why did you disappear the day you were questioned about it?"

Afraid of Accusations

"I had been quarrelling with my wife. I was afraid I would be accused of Mr. Small's disappearance. I don't know why I ran away."

"The caretaker of Mr. Small's Toronto theatre says you tried to bring him to enter into a plot to kidnap Mr. Small and hold him for ransom."

"I might have made such a joking

remark, but that was more than a year before Mr. Small was kidnapped."

"Why did you take a job under an assumed name in Oregon? Didn't you know there was a price of \$15,000 on your head?"

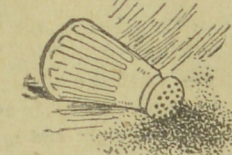
"I didn't. I took the first name that came into my head—a Pullman porter's. I wanted to hide."

"Did you know Clara Smith?"
"Yes; she was a friend of Mr. Small. But she had nothing to do with his kidnapping or disappearance. She has an alibi too. They took her to Montreal and got nothing from her. I don't know a thing about it."

Preparations are being made at Toronto to expedite arraignment and trial of Doughty, it was learned today.
