Cleveland, Nov. 27-The semi-an nual meeting of the National Cloak Suit and Skirt Manufacturers' Asso ciation here today was attended by more than 300 delegates, who discussed the new fashions for spring, as displayed by living models at the style show this afternoon.

No very radical changes are shown from the lines of fall and winter garments. Skirts continue short and straight. The slender silhouette predominates, and the youthful spirit was expressed in many garments shown. "Individuality is the keynote of early spring apparel," said Philip Frankel, Executive Secretary of the ssociation.

A wide choice in suits was dis played in straight, boxy jackets and loser fitting suit coats, with ripples t the sides and flat hanging panels front and back. Eton and bolero models give new effects with scallops, un even hems and coat edges. Tailored suits, with and without belts, are cut everely slender. Skirts are short, with a suggestion of more fulness; in some cases with panels, tunics hem rimmings and pleatings.
