CARPENTIER FOUND TRIP TO THE U.S. PROFITABLE

Said to Have Cleaned Up One Hundred Thousand Dollars in Three Months—Noted Pugilist and War Hero Has Returned to France, But Will be Back in America Next September, it is Reported.

Georges Carpentier, accompanied by Mme. Georges and a hundred thousand and Yankee dollars left our midst today on the Lorraine of the French line. The \$100,000 is what Jack Curley says Georges amassed during his three months stay here by flashing his blond teeth and white hair—no, his blond hair and white teeth—in the face of a movie camera.

M. Francois Descamps, who is Georges's Gallic manager, was in the party too, carefully watching the \$100,000 as long as the ship news reporters were near.

Collector of Internal Revenue Edwards admitted this week that Carpentier had paid him a "goodly sized check" as his income tax of eight per cent of what he had made in his brief stay in America but how much a goodly sized check can be cashed for Mr. Edwards did not say.

\$100,000 Isn't so Much

"After all \$100,000 isn't so much for Georges to get," said Jack. "You know he lost a fortune of half a million that he had invested in coal mines near his old home in Lens. Lost it in the war." Jack neglected to say whether the half million was dollars or francs.

Georges beamed cordially and made it known that he would return to this dear United States in early September. He says he is consumed with a great desire to fight Battling Levinsky for fifteen consecutive rounds on or about Oct. 10.

Somebody asked madame what had impressed her most during her stay here. Her answer delivered in hastily constructed English, marked an absolute and unprecedented departure in answers given by interviewed foreigners to this question.

"The skyline of lower Manhattan impressed me most," said Madame. "Next the busy life of the bustling multitude, and third the absence of trees in the streets."

"Fleas?" queried a reporter who was shell shocked in the war and is hard of hearing since then.

"No, trees," said Jack Curley, and that was all there was to that.

Then Georges came across with a hot one. He has found out something about American fighters that bids air to revolutionize the game over here.

"N'est-ce Pas?" Is Right.

"What are your impressions of American fighters?" was the question.

"I have observed the American fighter careful-lee," said Georges, "and I make this find. I find they all have the great desire to win, n'est-ce pas?"

"Mon Doo," cried the astounded reporters.

"They are very progressive," said Georges.

Then Jack Curley started to tell about the platinum watch that Georges and Mrs. Georges gave him as the

first instalment of their gratitude, but the captain said, "All ashore as is going ashore," and the interview closed.

New York, July 15—Failure to fight a dispossession proceeding and the annoyances of an eviction that came in due course were mentioned among the details of "cruel and inhuman" treatment alleged against George W. Finally she states in her complaint, he ignored the dispossession notice that led to an eviction and the abandonment of herself and their two children.

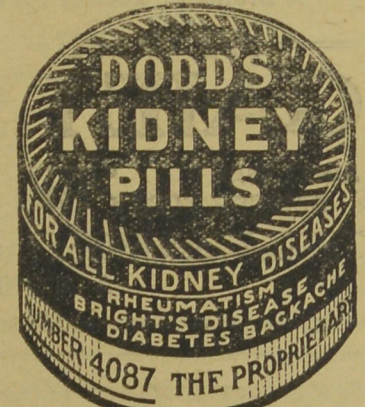
