

GLOUCESTER FIRST COUNTY WITH RETURNS

LIGHT VOTE IN ALL VOTING DIVISIONS

Cork and McAdam Two Wet
York County Polls—GloUCESTER Had a Small Dry
Majority.

Official returns sent to Fredericton, for the referendum on Prohibition held throughout the province on Saturday last so far have been received from only two counties, Gloucester and York. Gloucester had the distinction of being the first electoral division to make a return.

The returns are as follows:—
Gloucester—For Act, 2,395; Against Act, 1,266; For Wine and Beer, 1,389; Against Wine and Beer, 1,929.
York—For Act, 5,167; Against Act, 2,333; For Wine and Beer, 2,516; Against Wine and Beer, 4,784. Rejected ballots 92, split ballots 5.

In both counties a feature of the voting was the small proportion of voters who were sufficiently interested to cast their ballots.

Two Wet York Polls.
McAdam and Cork were two wet polls of York County outside the City of Fredericton. Cork was very wet. The returns were:—

Cork—For Act, 1; Against Act, 26; For Wine and Beer, 23; Against Wine and Beer, 1; Rejected ballot, 1. Total vote 30.

McAdam—For Act, 109; Against Act, 136; For Wine and Beer, 193; Against Wine and Beer, 101.

Other returns from this section of the county were:—

Fredericton—For Act 1,302; Against Act, 1,039; For Beer and Wine, 1,124; Against Beer and Wine, 1,220. Rejected ballots, 33. Total vote 2,462.
Devon—For Act, 354; Against Act, 148; For Wine and Beer, 175; Against Wine and Beer, 323. Rejected ballots 4. Total vote 526.

Marysville—For Act, 361; Against Act, 99; For Wine and Beer, 102; Against Wine and Beer, 336. Rejected ballots, 5. Total vote 630.

A carload of cement for street work has arrived, and the work of laying the concrete curbing in the upper end of Charlotte street has been resumed. A second carload of cement is now on the way here. The gutters on Charlotte street were opened a fortnight ago, but the work had to be stopped for want of cement.

Was a Busy Day.
The Circus brought a large crowd of people to the city yesterday from the surrounding country, and the hotels, restaurants and stores did a thriving business. All the trains coming to the city in the forenoon were crowded, and many people came in by auto and carriage. The crowd was a very orderly one and all appeared to enjoy themselves.

Taken Ill in St. John.
St. John Times: Moses Washington, colored, an employee of the Hagenbeck-Wallace circus was found lying in an alley off Germain street about noon today by Policeman Story. As the man appeared to be ill he was taken to the General Public Hospital where it was ascertained that he was quite ill and was held for treatment.

The Work Ended.
St. John Times: The information service branch of the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment, in Prince William street, was closed today and the work completed. This office, since opening in January, 1919, has had very important work to do, including furnishing information of all kinds to returned men, besides getting positions for the men and looking after their various needs in the way of instruction and guidance, not laid down in any rule book. This office has been in charge of Major F. H. Rowe, who has most successfully carried on the work in helping along the re-establishment of the soldier.

After Long Silence.
A letter of inquiry has been received by the Chief of Police in this city from John W. Robin, of Hamilton, Ont., in behalf of J. B. Martel, of Guernsey, Channel Islands, regarding the whereabouts of John Williamson. Mr. Robin who returned from England a year ago was asked while there by relatives of Mr. Williamson, to try and locate him in this country. On inquiry being made in Fredericton it developed that it is Harry Williamson one time C. P. R. station agent and bandmaster of this city that is referred to and communication is again established between Mr. Williamson and his relatives in the old country after a silence of between fifty and fifty-four years. Since his coming to Canada, over half a century ago Mr. Williamson got out of touch with his friends, and on a trip which he took to England in the year of the coronation of King George V. he was unsuccessful in his attempts to get any trace of his kin.

PAVING METHODS MUST BE CHANGED FOR ECONOMY

CITY COUNCIL WILL DECIDE MATTER TONIGHT

Contract System Will be Recommended Instead—Possibility That Work Will be Stopped.

The Fredericton City Council is expected to reach a decision at a special meeting tonight on the matter of street paving. Methods which have been followed this year and last have proved so expensive that a change must be made if any adequate showing is to be made for the expenditure. If the present rate of expense is maintained the bond-issue will be exhausted without the intended work being completed.

Day's work under direct supervision of City Engineer G. C. McDowell has been the method pursued. Paving by contract is the alternative or the cessation of the work for the present year. It is probable that there will be a decision to call for tenders. The point of whether the work will be done this year or next will then be decided.

Ald. C. C. Camp, chairman of the Street Committee, states that the committee is desirous of the matter being placed before the whole council. He personally is of the opinion that the expense is so great under the system followed to the present, that a change must be made.

Contract System Used Previously
Although the greater part of the street construction in Fredericton has been done by the city itself, there has been some work done by contract. The late Robert S. Lowe for the Hassam Company laid the concrete pavement on Queen and Carleton streets which still is giving good service. On King street between Westmorland and Carleton streets two blocks of water-bound macadam were laid at the same time by J. Duff Mitchell and Brown Maxwell who were in partnership. This street also has given good service although now rather worn out. That condition is to be expected as the street was laid eleven years ago and has been without repairs.

FERARI SHOWS AWAY.

G. W. V. A. Did Well on Week's Performances—Shows Went to St. John.

The Ferari Shows last night folded their tents like the Arab and as silently stole away, leaving Barrack Square very barren and forlorn. From here they will proceed to St. John, Moncton and Halifax, stopping for a week or more in each place. HIGH SCHOOL ENTRANCE EXAMS. DISAPPOINTING

THIRD DIVISION TOO LARGE IN PROPORTION

Seventeen Failures Among 118 Candidates—Conditional Admission for Many.

The results of the recent Fredericton High School Entrance Examinations are classified as under names being recorded alphabetically. The list of names in Division III. is larger than usual and the marks attained, in many cases, show weakness. It is possible a few of the applicants in this division may be admitted conditionally. Seventeen of the one hundred and eighteen failed to classify, twenty-nine are in first division, twenty-nine in second and forty-three in third.

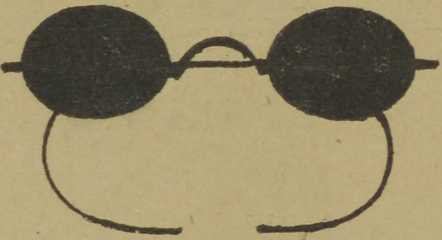
