HOW JUSTICE WAS HANDED OUT IN THE OLDEN DAYS

Thirteen Capital Offences in New York State at the Close of the Eighteenth Century—Cabbage Thieves Had to Stand in the Pillory With Cabbage on Their Heads—State Prison Quite a Modern Institution.

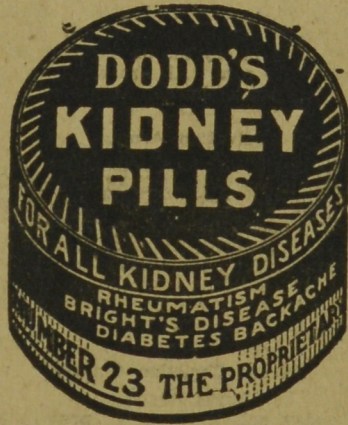
Imprisonment for any purpose, says Philip Klein in his "Prison Methods in New York State," published by Columbia University, "did not seem to be a favored process with our fathers of the eighteenth century." Old New York justice was sterner stuff. As late as 1788 there were thirteen capital offences in this State, including treason, murder, rape, burglary, feloniously taking goods from church, housebreaking, robbery of persons, arson of dwelling or barn, maiming, second offence in felony and "theft in chose in action and also abettor to the above." This seems Draconian until we are reminded by Dr. Klein that under the Colony laws of 1664 the death penalty could be inflicted for "denying the true God and His attributes," or, in the case of a child above 16, for striking a parent except when in danger of death or maiming. In the same period violation of the seventh commandment was a hanging matter in the case of two married persons. Pirates, counterfeiters, runaway slaves and debtors who perjured themselves were all booked for the gallows.

Nor were prisons considered necessary for minor offenders. Branding and whipping were for thieves, the stocks for Sabbath breakers the pillory for a variety of offences; the seventeenth century dealt not lightly with transgression. A man who stole cabbages from his neighbors garden had to stand in the pillory with the cabbages on his head and then was banished from the city for five years. So busy were the whipping post, pillory and stocks of this city that a set of these instruments had to be rebuilt twelve years after their construction. These were in the northeast part of City Hall Park, about where the brownstone Court House now stands. Hard by, between the jail and the almshouse, was the gallows in a "gaudily painted Chinese pagoda," and this was there as late as 1789 when ten death sentences were passed in the Court of Oyer and Terminer and five executions held on one day, the 23rd of October.

There was the prison of course, but most of its inmates were debtors or persons awaiting trial. Dr. Klein found the first reference to imprisonment

as a form of punishment in the laws of 1664 and barter was the offence punishable. In 1702 a forger or a counterfeiter might be sentenced to a prison term. In 1730 it was decreed that a slave who assaulted either Jew or Christian could be confined as well as flogged. In 1743 it became a prison offence to set fire to the woods in Suffolk or Dutchess county or Livingston Manor. Not until 1788 was disorderly conduct defined and imprisonment provided for it.

The prison came forward as a correctional place in 1796, when New York established its first State prison, wiped out capital punishment for all offences except treason and murder and provided life imprisonment for most of the crimes theretofore punishable by death. In the city prison the debtors found their previously almost exclusive residence entered by minor malefactors: men who stole broke the Sabbath or cursed, and women who formerly had been whipped, branded or banished. Unhappy devils the debtors who lived in an age so devoted to the conservation of creditors' pocketbooks! If they had only waited a century for their whack at life, those luckless wights who peered through the barred windows into City Hall Park, they could have yawned their way through the bankruptcy court.

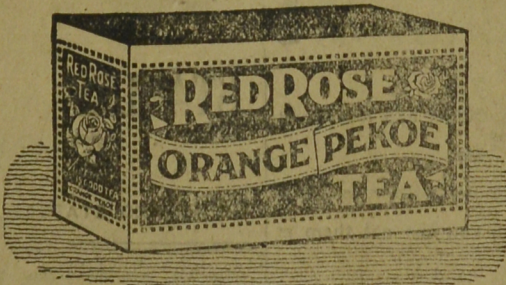
