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### THE TOURIST BUSINESS

The All New Brunswick Tourist, Game and Resources Association, launched a year ago with quite a flourish of trumpets, seems to be in a fair way of disappearing from the map, if it has not already done so. The recent convention at Dalhousie was rather slimly attended and it was decided to amalgamate with the New Brunswick Tourist Association with headquarters at St. John. The trouble with the All New Brunswick Tourist Game and Resources Association, was that it apparently bit off more than it could properly chew. Had it given its attention to the great natural resources of the province and the attractions it offers visiting motorists and left the fish and game features alone, it might have got along swimmingly. The province already had two Tourist associations which were doing good work, besides a corps of efficient guides who have established a strong connection in the United States. In addition there is the Department of Lands and Mines, which has always been a factor in encouraging sportsmen to visit the province.

The outbreak of the war naturally caused a lull in the activities of American sportsmen, but the business will come back and the province stands to get all the nonresident big game hunters and fishermen that it can properly take care of, consistent with game protection and conservation. Without any financial resources of its own the association which is now on the toboggan, started in to do business with some smooth tongued Americans who are interested in the tourist business from the standpoint of dollars and cents. They told a nice story about the great things they were prepared to do in the way of boosting the attractions of the province and the association promptly fell for it. Heavy expenses were incurred and there was no money with which to pay the bills. Having got in bad it is now proposed that the association be merged with the New Brunswick Tourist Association and that the government grant be increased to \$5000. The Fredericton Tourist Association naturally enough refused to stand for this jug-handled arrangement and the members say they will not be a party to any merger that might be brought about.

The idea of having one central organization for the promotion of tourist travel may be all right but it will be difficult to work out in the province. New Brunswick covers a large territory and it means both time and money to travel from place to place. Few people from the southern counties attended the recent convention at Dalhousie and few from that section of the province will journey to St. John to attend future meetings of the remodelled tourist association. That being the case it means that the N. B. Tourist Association will remain a St. John organization and other sections of the province will have little or nothing to say in connection with its operations.

Before the government makes a grant of \$5000 for tourist publicity work it should give the whole matter very careful consideration with a view of working out some plan by which all sections of the province from Madawaska and Restigouche to Campbellbell will be guaranteed a square deal.

### AN N. B. BOY MAKING GOOD AS SCULPTOR

Amherst, N. S.—June 25—Mr. Harold Tingley of the firm of J. A. Tingley & Son, monument manufacturers of this town, formerly of Albert County, N. B., is achieving success in sculptural work. His firm recently erected a soldiers' monument at Hopewell Cape, Albert County and have a contract for another to be installed at Great Village, N. S. Mr. Tingley has made with his own hands the clay model of a soldier in uniform for the statue, and returned men and others who have been privileged to see it pronounce it a splendid piece of work. The model is about seven feet high, shows a soldier in service uniform with rifle and bayonet. The model will be forwarded to Boston, where a bronze statue will be cast from it.

Dr. Tingley practised sculptural work while a student at Mount Allison and he recently took a course in New York under the tuition of one of the most noted sculpturists in America. He seems to be specially gifted for this line of work. It is the intention of the firm to establish a branch in Sussex, N. B., in the near future.
