## PLENTY OF FARM HELP AT DORCHESTER

The Penitentiary Farm Cuts One Thousand Tons of Hay Annually—Other Work Not Slighted.

Dorchester, June 24—The problem of securing farm help does not worry the authorities of the Maritime Penitentiary here. The prison population has increased rapidly during the past year, and it has been found necessary to provide additional accommodations. There is a splendid farm, including a large block of marsh land, in connection with the institution, and the annual hay crop runs close to one thousand tons. It is all made and housed by the convicts, who work under the direction of armed guards. During the haying season it is a common sight to see a party of a score or more of these men, each carrying a pitchfork, set out from the prison en route to the hay fields. The convicts seem to be glad of the opportunity for a change, and perform about as much work in a day as hired help will do.

What is probably the finest barn in the Province is attached to the penitentiary. The work was entirely done by prison labor. A few years ago many head of beef cattle were raised and fattened at the institution, but an outbreak of disease caused a let-up in this branch of farming.

The prison and grounds are now lighted by electricity, and from the same plant light is supplied to the village at a reasonable rate.

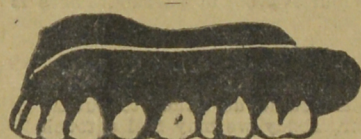

## A MORAL ISSUE AT STAKE IN REFERENDUM

Mr. A. C. M. Lawson Discusses the Issue of the Approaching Battle at the Polls.

To the Editor of the Mail:

Sir:—  
Be good enough to permit a few observations and quotations. Thank you.

If Prohibition should be defeated in the vote of July 10th proximo, I would agree with Premier Foster and have government agencies for the sale of booze rather than the old-fashioned licensed bar. The money then derived from the sale would belong to the Province, blood-money though it would be. The voters who are lukewarm and stay that way till election day is a thing of the past will regret it for the balance of their days.

The anti-prohibitionists are using some advertising. I want to investigate. We will look at one entitled A Matter of Regulations. They claim there is no Moral Issue at stake in the coming Referendum. I think there is, but if not there are many Immoral Issues. The next sentence or division misquotes and misapplies a portion of a scriptural text. Turn up the last few verses of I Cor. 9th Chapter to get the correct bearing. The next point they try to make is to bring discredit upon the Prohibitory Act, by saying that it "has bred crime rather than suppressed it, created lawlessness and brought misery and poverty to many homes." We have had crimes in spite of the Law, because doctors, vendors, inspectors and others have not done their full duty, but less in number and seriousness. Because people have broken the law misery and poverty, as with other laws, have followed interests are not interested in the present campaign, they have no come-back whatever happens. They know if Prohibition is carried by a big majority the Dominion Government will soon stop the inter-provincial traffic. The next and last main reference is to the Wine and Beer under Government control which is the second question on the Ballot. The wine, beer, cider, ale and other fermented liquors touch the most vital part and are known as "the devil's kindling wood" and the Irishman's advice should be heeded by all our young people—"leave off before you begin."

They wind up their advertisement with "Let us have a change in the system." They will vote against the question and for the last. Will you go and do likewise or the opposite? Permit now a lengthy quotation from an address of the late John B. Finch delivered at Moore's Opera House Des Moines, Iowa, U. S. A. Apr. 23rd 1882: "Just as well build up a man by putting lice on his head as to hope to build up the material interest of a city by opening dram-shops. In every business relation the liquor traffic of the country is an institution which received value without returning it. It lives on society as parasites live on other bodies. A saloon bears the same relation to legitimate business that a bed-bug does to a man who sleep in the bed where the bed-bug lives. You would admire a louse as much as you do a honey bee if it lived in the same way. Some of the parasites are among the most beautiful of insects. It is the way they live—by sucking their life out of other life—that raises the feeling of disgust and leads to their destruction. It is not a liquor-seller's clothes or looks which causes society to detest him and his trade; it is the way he lives on society—a mere parasite on business life. As the shingles go on his house they fall off the house of his customers; as he and his family live easily in idleness, his customers and his customer's family suffer in rags. For this crime of parasitism he is on trial."

"I do not like to drag anything into a position where is ought not to be, and I feel at this point like apologizing to the bed-bug. You ask what I mean: I will tell you. I never knew a bed-bug mean enough to eat another bed-bug, nor one louse mean enough to eat another louse. It remains for the last and highest order which God Created in His own image, to develop the type which will live on their own kind and off their own species; who will fasten the fangs of parasitic avarice in the pulsating flesh of their own kin, their own blood their own sex and their own race; and grow rich, not by the destruction of other species, not by the destruction of other orders, but by the destruction of individuals who feel the same, who enjoy the same as they do. It is unfair to a parasite, that lives on other forms of life, to compare it with a class low enough, vile enough, to live on its own kind without a feeling of sympathy, without a pulsation of regret."

## DAILY SERVICE ON THE VALLEY RAILWAY

Passenger Trains to Run on Week Days on the Same Schedule as at Present—Through Sleeper to Quebec Daily Except Sunday.

With the time changes on Canadian National Lines effective June 27th the Passenger Train on the Valley Railway will run every week day on the same schedule as at present, viz. No. 47 will leave St. John at 12.55 noon (eastern time) and reach Fredericton at 4.30 p. m. leaving for Centreville at 5.00 p. m.

No. 48 will leave Centreville at 6.00 a. m. arriving in Fredericton at 10.00 a. m. and leaving for St. John at 10.30 a. m.

There will be a mixed train service from St. John to Fredericton on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, and from Fredericton to St. John on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. A mixed train will also go to Centreville on Monday, Wednesday and Friday and arrive from Centreville on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

The through sleeping car for Quebec via McGivney and the Trans-continental will run daily except Sunday, the trains between McGivney and Quebec having been put on daily schedule.
