UNDERGROUND PROPAGANDA.

The recent presidential election in the United States did not get by without its prize roorback sprung by somebody on behalf of the Democratic party almost on the eve of polling day. It was nothing more nor less than a flagrant attempt to raise the race cry against Senator Harding, the Republican candidate by calculating a report that he had negro blood in his veins. The Republicans got wise to the despicable methods resorted to by their opponents, and took prompt action with a view of refuting the slander. This would have been a far less difficult matter had the canvass been used on the public platform or by the newspapers of the party, but not being of such a nature as would bear the light of day, its authors as is usually the case, preferred to carry on an underground propaganda. A Washington correspondent is responsible for the statement that the lying stuff in printed or typewritten form was in evidence on Governor Cox's special train and was disseminated by a young man closely connected with the Ohio Democratic state committee.

The director of publicity of the Republican national committee, dealt with the miserable calumny in a published statement in which he said:

"In all the annals of United States politics, there is nothing approaching this infamous chapter which must arouse the righteous wrath and indignation of every right-thinking man and woman the country over.

"To the everlasting credit of United States journalism no Democratic newspaper of consequence has been so debased as to lend itself to such campaign methods or touch the slander.

"It has been more than a 'whispering campaign'. It has been a sinister plot and conspiracy. The overwhelming election of Harding and Coolidge will be the answer of such campaign tactics."

The director of publicity having called public attention to the roorback the Cincinnati Times Star came out in a vigorous editorial in which it stated the facts in connection with Senator Harding's ancestry, and went after the slanderers in this fashion:

"Fifty years ago, personal scandal and whispered lies against the candidates played a considerable part in American politics. Until this year it seemed that we had been getting away from that sort of thing. This year the Democrats have tried to turn the block back 50 years.

"They have attempted to revive the spirit of underhand partisanship which was quite usual in America in the days when blackguards attacked the ancestry of the mother of Abraham Lincoln and said that Lincoln himself was illegitimate.

"Most of the energy of the underground section of the Democratic campaign has been devoted to the circulation of a lie about Harding's ancestry. No responsible Democrat has dared spread it in the open, but many Democrats have passed it around, hand to hand."

Just what effect the roorback had in influencing public opinion we do not know, but we do know that "the righteous wrath and indignation of an overwhelming majority of the right thinking men and women of the country" was aroused against the candidates of the Democratic party in the late election and Harding and Coolidge, the Republican nominees, were swept into power by a record breaking majority. As a vote getter the underground propaganda carried on on behalf of the Democratic party

By their steadfastness to sound doctrines, by their intelligent treatment of national problems, the women of the United States have abundantly vindicated the judgment that put the ballot into their hands."
