## COUNSEL SAID WITNESS IN A DIVORCE ACTION WAS "FRESH"—INTERESTING EVIDENCE IN CASE

Defended Case of Kealty vs. Kealty, from Restigouche County, Presents Some Unusual Features—A Witness States That Acts of Infidelity Occurred While a Wake was in Progress—Testimony Given Yesterday.

The Divorce Court Friday afternoon was engaged in hearing evidence in the case of Francis James Kealty vs Lydia Kealty, a Restigouche County case which had begun in the morning. G. H. Hutchinson and C. D. Richards appeared for the plaintiff and R. B. Hanson, K. C., and J. A. LeBlanc for the defendant.

F. J. Kealty.

F. J. Kealty the plaintiff was the first witness examined. He stated that he and the defendant were married October 28, 1913, by Rev. Father Daigle at Jacquet River, Restigouche County. The wife of the witness before marriage was Lydia Furlotte. For some time the plaintiff and his wife resided at the home of her parents he paying board and she assisting in the work of the household. April 15th, 1915, they left the Furlotte home and started housekeeping themselves. In May of that year a child was born. Frequently at that time the wife would go to her parents' home for prolonged visits. The husband objected. A nurse named Mary Bernard was secured to care for the child. July 1st, 1915, witness and his wife separated. The home of the wife's parents was distant about half a mile and the wife would take the eldest child with her. The baby cried during its mother's absence and kept witness awake at nights which made his objection to his wife's absences the stronger. One Sunday morning the wife went to her parents' place and stayed till Monday night. He objected strongly and she said that she would go if she pleased and would stay as long as she liked. On July 1st, 1915 she went there permanently. Before she left witness asked her to think over the matter carefully before deciding. Witness remained at work at Jacquet River and boarded until February, 1917. His wife stayed at her father's and he saw her there several times and the two were as man and wife until December 1916. In August of that year the wife expressed regret that she had left her own home to return to that of her father. In February 1917 the witness went to work on the railway and worked until May 1917. He never resumed the married relation with his wife after December 1916.

In July 1917 witness saw his wife leave a dance hall at four o'clock one morning in company with a drunken man. At various times he saw her in the company of other men. He also saw a third child with her. The other two were his own.

Cross-Examination.

R. B. Hanson cross-examined the witness severely. The witness said he had lived at Jacquet River three years before marriage. He was not his wife's first love nor was he hers. At times he got drunk but he had no falling out with his wife on that account. It was not true that he had left his father-in-law's home because of a quarrel with his brother-in-law. It was not true that the day of the birth of one of their children his wife had difficulty in rousing him from a drunken slumber. His wife had not

threatened to leave him on account of his conduct.

Clash Occurred.

At this point there was a clash between the witness and counsel. Mr. Hanson said that the witness was trying to get fresh. Judge Crockett said that he did not think the witness was trying that.

Continuing the witness said, that one of the matters on which his wife and himself had disagreed had been the occurrence of lice on their little boy. He blamed his wife for that. He was not taking action for divorce because he was seeking re-marriage.

Mrs. Lena Meide.

Mrs. Lena Meide of Beckettville, Lena Furlotte prior to marriage, was the next witness. She said she is a second cousin of the defendant. She knew Rudolph or Duff Furlotte and often saw him at her mother's house. He mother died August 23, 1917. A wake was held until the second day following. During the wake the defendant Mrs. Kealty was at the house and so was Duff Furlotte. Witness had sat up with her mother three nights and was tired when the wake was being held. The night after the death of her mother Mrs. Kealty asked witness if she wanted to go upstairs to rest and offered to go with her. Witness took the lamp and went upstairs first. Mrs. Kealty followed. Duff was sitting on the stairs as they passed. Mrs. Kealty slapped him on the shoulder as she passed but said nothing to him. It was a signal for Duff to follow. He did enter the room after witness had lain down across the bed. She asked Mrs. Kealty who had come in and was told, "Only Duff Furlotte." The three lay crosswise on the bed. Mrs. Kealty was next Furlotte. After Furlotte and Mrs. Kealty thought the witness had fallen asleep Furlotte "talked dirt" to Mrs. Kealty. Infidelity on the part of Mrs. Kealty with Duff then followed. Witness said nothing as she did not want to hurt Mrs. Kealty's feelings. Witness left the room later leaving the others lying across the bed.

The court then adjourned until ten o'clock this morning.

At a conference between counsel at noon recess Friday it was decided to place the amount of suit-money at eighty dollars up to that time. The court announced that counsel-fees had been set at twenty-five dollars per day.

## YOUNG GIRL MURDERED

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 5—Miss Edna Ellis, eighteen years of age, was found murdered in a clump of weeds in a vacant lot in the northern section of the city today. Miss Ellis was a stenographer and was considered pretty. Her throat had been slashed and a broken razor was found near the body.

The girl had been beaten severely. Both eyes were discolored and her left jaw was swollen. The body bore numerous marks of maltreatment.

The condition of the ground near where the body was found indicated Miss Ellis fought desperately with her assailant. The lot is located in a populous section.

Miss Ellis who lived near the scene of the murder was last seen getting of a street car in the neighborhood en route home from work last evening. Shortly before the body was found at 9 a. m. Miss Ellis' mother reported to police that her daughter had not come home last night.

Police began a search of the neighborhood and footprints in the lot led to the discovery of the body.
