REFINERS ARE SAID TO BE IN BETTER SHAPE

Montreal Nov. 2.—The present week has seen a distinct improvement in the situation of the sugar refiners, although it is, of course, uncertain whether this will be permanent. Reports from New York, however, show a stiffening in the market there, with an advance in raws. It is believed that the situation in Cuba will soon be well in hand, and this will prevent the hanging over the market of several hundred tons of raws that might be offered otherwise at still lower prices. By their action this week in dropping the price of refined to 17 cents net the Canadian manufacturers feel that they have practically met the danger of heavy importations of United States sugar, as there is little margin now for the importer even at the lowest quoted prices f. o. b. New York. Moreover there is little sugar to be picked up there at the bottom quotations, for most of the refiners are holding the jobs to the prices at which the contracts for October and November delivery were made, although they have extended credits to them of six months or more, to enable them to meet payments more readily. This means that all this sugar can be offered at low prices only through a heavy loss on the part of the jobber. Under these conditions so far little sugar has come into the Canadian market from across the border.

The letters of the members of the Board of Commerce in forwarding their resignations are considered by the refiners as justifying them fully in the position they took before the Government in the matter of seeking protection. At the same time there does not seem to be much hope existing among them of obtaining any as-

IRISH PROBLEM DISCUSSED IN THE HOUSE

London, Nov. 4.—In the House of Commons today T. P. O'Connor raised a debate by attacking what he described as the authorities' policy of frightfulness in Ireland which he declared was adding new battalions to the Sinn Fein army and besmirching Britain's good name.

Joseph Devlin, Belfast, and other members strongly denounced the reprisals in Ireland.

Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, replying, gave statistics showing that the military and police were not faltering in their endeavors to maintain the strictest discipline. Nine constables were under arrest, two of them charged with murder. General Sir Nevil MacCready, commander of the forces, had inquired into every charge against the troops, and disciplinary action had been taken in ten cases. Trials had been ordered in other cases, including seven men for complicity in the destruction of property at Mallow.

He said it was the government's duty to defeat the organized and armed attempt to intimidate the government into granting the independence of Ireland. If the government relented in this, the policy of assassination would spread to England. The best way to put a stop to what were reprisals, said the secretary, was to stop the campaign of murder against the police and military.

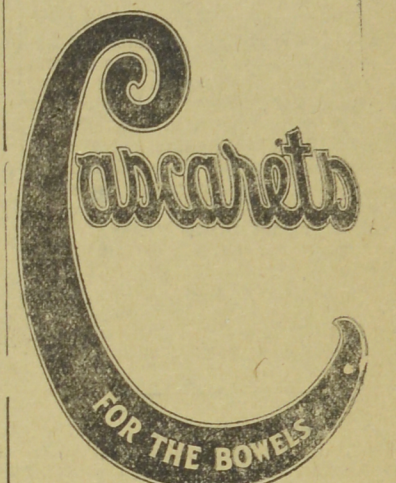

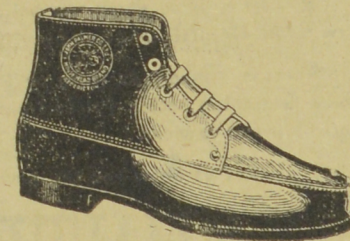

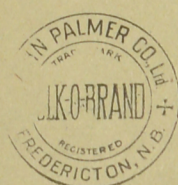
