

## MINTO COAL HAS HIGHEST REPUTATION

### MONTREAL DISCOVERS ITS STEAM QUALITIES

Coal Cannot be Mined Fast Enough for the Demand—Labor Troubles Gradually Settling.

Sir Thomas Tait of Montreal president of The Minto Coal Company passing through Fredericton on his way to Montreal after inspection of the company's property at Minto stated that the Minto coal had secured the highest reputation for steaming purposes in Montreal and that the demand could not be met. The consumers of coal in the Canadian metropolis are surprised at the high qualities shown by the New Brunswick coal.

#### Labor Trouble Settled

The labor troubles on the operations of the Minto Coal Company are practically settled. The company is now desirous that the miners sign an agreement to work. Many of the men wish to go to work again and it is expected that a large crew will soon be at work. At present two pits are operating in addition to stripping operations. There is daily output of one hundred and thirty tons.

#### Big Wage Increase

The big wage increase decided upon at the sessions of the commissions has been put into effect. The price of coal is high with little prospect of a fall for some time. The price is governed largely by the price in the United States. When production catches up with the demand the price will fall but not before. Any alteration is some months in the future.

#### Operators Claim Victory.

Operators in the Minto field claim a victory over the U. M. W. in the matter of recognition of the union and payment of the union dues. Only the smaller operators have acceded to the demand of the union in that regard.

#### Parcels For Argentine.

Arrangements have been made whereby parcels may be forwarded direct to the Argentine Republic in addition to the present service via the United Kingdom. The rate of postage will be 12 cents per pound or fraction thereof, and the limit of weight 11 pounds. The service is to be monthly and will go into effect with the first sailing in November, which will be that of the S. S. "Canadian Seigneur" sailing from Montreal on or about the 18th November.

## MORE EVIDENCE IN RESTIGOUCHE DIVORCE CASE

### STORY OF MRS. MEIDE SUPPORTED BY ANOTHER

Witnesses Cross-Examined Severely by R. B. Hanson—Do Not Depart from Principal Facts.

In the Divorce Court this morning the case of James Francis Kealty vs. Lydia Kealty was continued. The examination of Mrs. Lena Meide was completed. Other witnesses were Miss Mary Renaud and Mrs. Ellen Degrechie, both of Jacquet River. Miss Renaud's evidence was to the effect that the plaintiff husband had always treated his wife well. Mrs. Degrechie gave evidence relative to alleged misconduct between the defendant wife and Duff Furlotte at the wake of Mrs. Susan Furlotte at Jacquet River, which had been touched upon in the evidence of Mrs. Meide.

The witnesses were subjected to rigid cross examination by R. B. Hanson, K. C., who is associated with J. A. LeBlanc in the case. C. D. Richards is associated with G. H. Hutchinson for the plaintiff.

Miss Mary Renaud, nurse for the children of the principals in the suit, was on the stand. She said that she had not seen the plaintiff drunk and never had heard him use threatening language to his wife. After Mrs. Kealty had left home the witness had not continued as nurse as she did not want people to talk about her. She never was afraid of Kealty.

Mrs. Ellen Degrechie of Jacquet River was the next witness. She said she was a second cousin of the defendant and lived two doors away from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Kealty while they were keeping house. She was acquainted with both Duff Furlotte and Mrs. Lena Meide. Witness attended the wake of her step-grandmother to which Mrs. Meide had made reference in her evidence. On the second night of the wake at about midnight Mrs. Meide who had gone upstairs with Mrs. Kealty came down and told the witness something. Witness in consequence of what she was told went upstairs with Mrs. Kealty, the latter carrying the lamp. Duff Furlotte and the defendant Mrs. Kealty were seen lying across a bed by the witness. Furlotte had his boots off. Mrs. Kealty asked witness, "Do you want a place to lie down?" Witness replied that she did not and went downstairs again. In the morning Arthur Furlotte whose mother was dead told Mrs. Kealty to come out of the room. Mrs. Kealty came down stairs putting up her hair, which was disarranged. Mrs. Arthur Furlotte said to Mrs. Kealty, "This is no place for you to be". Mrs. Kealty replied "Poor Duff would not harm any person".

In the summer of 1920 witness saw Mrs. Kealty with a third child. Of her own knowledge she did not know whether or not the child was Mrs. Kealty's.

## ANOTHER ARREST MADE IN D. S. C. R. THEFT CASE

### B. DENNISON, IMPLICATED, APPEARED FOR A REMAND

Case Against Elwood Kitchen Held on Similar Charge, Finished on Friday—Remanded.

Blair Dennison of this city has been arrested on a charge of stealing stores from the Fredericton Hospital D. S. C. R. He appeared in the police court this morning and was remanded for examination. Dennison was implicated in the theft. The case against Elwood Kitchen also charged with similar theft was completed Friday afternoon and the accused was remanded until Tuesday for judgment.

The case of Elwood Kitchen charged with stealing thirteen sheets, six pillows and two blankets from the stores of the Fredericton Military Hospital was continued yesterday at 2.30 p. m. in the police court. The examination of Mr. Ray Brewer was completed. He declared that on Monday evening the accused and some other man came near a back door of the hospital as he had arranged with them previously, and delivered parcels containing the stolen goods. Witness admitted to Mr. J. R. Gale, who appeared for Major S. S. Wetmore, the informant, that the lock and hasp of the store room had been tampered with sometime Saturday night.

The other man did not come near. Witness could not swear who he was. He found the bundles to contain thirteen sheets three blankets and six or seven pillows. He had goods put in a room and did not further "bother with them".

Cross-Examined by Mr. J. R. Gale, witness said lock and hasp of linen room had been tampered with.

Cross-examined by C. L. Dougherty for the defendant the witness said he told Blair Dennison to bring goods back to B Ward at 8.30. Says he made no promises that if this was done no one would see it. Made no arrangements that night watchman should not be around but said he would not arrange to lay a trap for them. Was told that they would bring them back. Saw Kitchen again that day with another man near D. S. C. R. buildings. Were carrying something which they dropped. Mr. Edward Lauren, D. S. C. R. employee was with him. Brewer told Kitchen to go back to work and not to do such a foolish thing again. Nursing Sisters Grimley and Barnhill were present.

Other witnesses were examined and Kitchen was remanded till Tuesday for judgment.

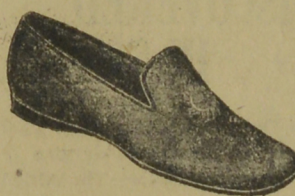
