RECORD CORN CROP IN U. S.

Washington Nov. 8.—A record crop of corn in the United States exceeding the previous largest crop by 75,000,000 bushels was announced today by the Department of Agriculture in its preliminary estimate, placing the production this year at 3,199,120,000 bushels. Tobacco production this year also established a record with a total output of 1,476,444,000 pounds, or 87,000,000 pounds more than last year's record crop.

Increases were shown for a number of crops including potatoes, 7,000,000 bushels; sweet potatoes, 2,000,000 bushels and apples 8,000,000 bushels.

THE POLITICAL CAMPAIGN IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

The Pacific Province is Being Combed by Third Party Candidates—The First Election Since the War—Two Dozen Candidates for the Six Seats in Vancouver—Hon. C. E. Tisdale Will Try His Luck Again.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 1.—This Province is in the midst of the most interesting general election campaign in many years. No one appears at all sure as to just how it will turn out. This is in great part due to the presence of so many third party candidates in the constituencies. Moreover it is the first election since the War. The Oliver administration was elected in September, 1916, and there have been no by elections for a long period even to indicate how the Government sizes up with the farmers or returned soldiers. There are six seats in Vancouver City, and already there are over two dozen candidates who are almost sure to go to the polls. The United Farmers, while not in the fight as a provincial organization, intend to contest at least twenty seats as local organizations. The Federated Labor Party, which is that important part of the organized labor movement not allied with either the One Big Union or the international trades unions, will place about two dozen candidates in the field. The United Public Service Council, which is a union of the international affiliation branch of labor and the war veterans, will contest all six local seats and several others. Besides all these, there are the straight Socialist candidates in probably a dozen ridings, several war veteran nominees, Independent Liberals, Independent Conservatives, the straight party candidates, and finally, in Vancouver, a journalist named Ashworth has been nominated as the Rent Payers' candidate. Just now the regular political parties will emerge from this scramble it is impossible to forecast with any degree of accuracy. Premier Oliver expresses optimism, and the Opposition leader, Mr. Bowser, retallates by declaring the Premier is unable to secure a seat for himself to run in. In this city, it looks as if the man and not the label will get the majority of the votes. Anybody may head the polls. The Liberal candidates, in Vancouver, will include Hon. Mr. Farris, Mr. M. A. Macdonald, former Attorney General, and Mrs. Ralph Smith. The Conservative slate will include Mr. Bowser, Mr. C. E. Tisdale, former Minister of Public Works, and at least one woman and one war veteran.

Government Control

Very few people expected the recent landslide in favor of Government

control and sale of liquor. Certainly not Premier Oliver, who admitted later that he not only voted dry, but would be sustained by an overwhelming majority. This being the case the Government may be pardoned in not having a Government control bill all ready for submission to the electors. According to statements made by the Premier and by the Attorney General Mr. Farris, the bill will not be made public until it is presented to the new Legislature to discuss. This has aroused the ire of Mr. Bowser, who is demanding that it should be put before the electors at once, so that they can pass an opinion on it. He declares that Mr. Oliver is afraid to do so, and, in effect, that he is trying to get back to power under false pretences. Premier Oliver replied by refusing to be drawn into any prohibition side issue. He wants the electors to pass on the record of his Government as it stands. Outside of this matter, the campaign issues appear to be few and insignificant. Each side accuses the other of extravagance in office but there is no scandals to enliven the campaign.
