The Vacancy.

All members were present. There was one vacancy caused by the death of the late D. J. Buckley. The Lumbermen's Association has been re quested to select a member to fill the vacant place as representative of Crown Land lessees.

The term of office of Archibald Fraser as representative of the private timber-limit holders expires December 31. His successor will be appointed after that date.

J. D. Vanderbeck, M. P. P., tender ed his resignation as member of the Board of Examiners of Fire Rangers. No appointment will be made to the vacant office until next Board meet ing, January 12th.

Burnt Lumber Question.

A delegation of limit-notders composed of J. W. Brankley, J. P. Burchill and W. B. Snowball appeared before the Board and asked for per mission to export burnt lumber to the United States from Crown Lands as pulpwood. The Act of 1911 forbids export of lumber in the round to the United States the intention being to encourage the manufacture of lumber in this province. The delegation advanced various arguments in support of its request notably that the lumber was in danger of destruction after be ing burnt unless cut as soon as possi-

LAMBSKINS ARE CHEAPER

Council from the Board.

Montreal Nov. 5-Lamb skins this fall are bringing only a tenth of last Fear's price but the sensational drop has added seven cents a pound to the cost of the meat according to a butcher of the Bonsecours Market and is partly responsible for the high price of lamb. In November 1919 raw hides could not be purchased for less than \$5.00 each for the first grade skins while today quotations are from 4 cents to 60 cents. Although this abnormal decline should make the cheap er grades of shoes and gloves tumble in price it was stated the immediate effect is to increase the cost of the rest of the carcass and add to the value of the meat.

Unusually heavy export to the United States which has continued longer than was anticipated has also caus ed lamb to be dearer and the wholesale price went up to two or three Assorted at 70c. per lb. cents a pound this week. Local butchers prophesy that the raise will soon be passed on to the housewife, but the market prices are for the time being

Butter remains firm and the rates chaged by various firms are exhibiting greater uniformity than they showed two weeks ago, when the arket was weak. Game is increasing in prices as the hunters are driven in by the cold weather, but with the advancing season the birds are also heavier and the purchaser receives better value than he does for September birds. Turkeys are cheaper in price as corn becomes available at more reasonable rates, and the Barn yard King can now be obtained for nine cents a pound less than last sum mer. Little change is reported in fruit and vegetables, but the rectent winds have blown down a considerable num ber of apples and placed large consignments of windfalls on the market it is said.

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
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
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
