PATENT GIVE THE RIGHT

Two New Partnerships Formed
—New Transportation Com-
pany With Head Office
at St. John.

St. John Transportation, Limited, with head office at St. John and capital stock of ten thousand dollars, has been incorporated. Those in the company are Arthur William Frederick Powell, Mrs. Louisa Blanche Powell and S. A. M. Skinner all of the City of St. John. The company is empowered to carry on business as expressmen, truckmen, carriers of passengers and garage owners as well as other business activities.

Partnership.
J. Manning Dimock, auto mechanic, and George A. Stephenson merchant, both of St. John, have formed a partnership under the name of J. Manning Dimock & Co. The business is to be carried on in the city of St. John, in the line of selling automobiles and their accessories.

Peter Butler of Alnwick Northumberland County and Luke Gotro of the same place have formed a partnership under the name of Butler & Gotro, to carry on a business of buying and selling pulpwood, ties and other lumber and for purpose of operating a sawmill at St. Wilfrid's, Leg-aceville, in the parish of Alnwick.

Supplementary letters patent have given the Minto Coal Company, Limited, powers to hold the annual meeting of the company and special and general meetings at a place or places within or without the province of New Brunswick as the president may determine.

ARMISTICE DAY WILL BE WELL OBSERVED

PROCESSION EARLY
IN THE AFTERNOON

To Begin at Normal School and
End at Parliament Square
—Speeches Will be
Made.

Armistice Day anniversary will be observed in Fredericton in most fitting manner Thursday. The six guns captured by Canadian troops from the Germans and presented to the Province of New Brunswick as war trophies, will be formally accepted by Premier Foster who will present two of them to the City of Fredericton.

Procession Organized.
Ald. F. L. Cooper and his Committee of the City Council which has had the matter in hand have organized a procession which will take part in the demonstration.

School children will be given a half holiday to take part in the proceedings. They will assemble at 1 p. m. at the Provincial Normal School and at 1.15 the procession will march off. Its composition is announced as follows:

Fredericton Brass Band
Pupils of Public Schools
Students of Provincial Normal School
Boy Scouts

York Regt. Band
Veterans of Great War
Captured German Guns
Gun-teams and Crews

Arrangements have been made for four-horse teams for each of the captured German guns and also for gun-crews to ride on the guns and limbers.

Route to be Followed.
The route which will be followed by the procession is as follows: York street to Charlotte street, Charlotte street to Smythe street, Smythe street to Queen street, Queen street to Parliament Square. The route is almost all over paved streets.

Speeches Will be Made.
At Parliament Square there will be speeches made. The first presentation will be on behalf of the Federal authorities to the Province of New Brunswick. Premier Foster will accept and will present two guns to the city. These will be the guns to be placed in front of the Customs House and at the junction of King and Brunswick streets with Woodstock Road. There will be a speech of acceptance on the part of the city government.

BEAVERBROOK WAS PLEASED.

Early announcements of the New Brunswick provincial elections in London newspapers reported that Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, had been defeated. The report, however, was corrected in the course of a few days, and soon afterwards Lord Beaverbrook wrote Hon. Mr. Veniot tendering his congratulations. In his letter, which was written under date of October 25th, he says:

"I am enormously pleased to learn that the rumor was incorrect, and I congratulate you heartily on your wonderful majority."

DELEGATIONS BEFORE GOVT. THIS MORNING

RETAIL MERCHANTS TOLD
ACT APPLIES TO CLERKS

Temperance Men Heard re a
Successor to W. D. Wilson
and Appointment of a
Commission.

Premier Foster stated early this afternoon at the conclusion of the morning session of the Provincial Government that there had been no consideration given the matter of appointment to cabinet positions.

Alliance Delegation.
A delegation from the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance composed of His Lordship the Bishop of Fredericton and W. G. Clark was heard by the Government this morning. This delegation urged upon the government the advisability of appointing the commission for the handling of the sale of liquor in New Brunswick as provided for under The Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916. It also urged the appointment of a successor to W. D. Wilson as Chief Inspector under the same Act. No names were mentioned in connection with the last matter.

Retail Merchants' Delegation.
A large delegation representing the Retail Merchants' Association in Fredericton St. John and other places in the Province also was heard.

The delegation urged that retail business be excluded from the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Act. A number of speakers supported this contention. The chief argument was that there should be a distinction between wholesale and retail business because the retail businesses with greater risk than the wholesale, contribute more in taxation to all governments.

Reply of Premier.
The reply of Premier Foster was that the large army of clerks employed in the retail businesses of New Brunswick came under the scope of the Act and deserved consideration in the matter of compensation for injury.

The Water Powers Commission is to appear before the Government this afternoon. The chairman Hon. E. A. Smith may make an announcement concerning contracts for construction work after the conference.

Many Here for Meeting.
This meeting of the government has attracted a large number of persons interested in various matters and the hotel registers contain numerous names of members of the legislature, former members, government officials and others.

Car Damaged in Collision.
A car driven by Herbert Chase had one of its axles damaged at about 9.30 last night, when it collided in Carleton street with a wagon loaded with sawdust from York & Sunbury mill, driven by Arthur Titus. The car was not so badly damaged that it could not move away under its own power.

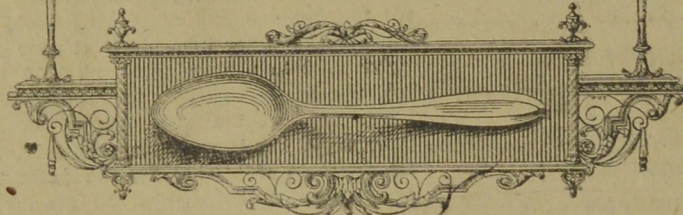

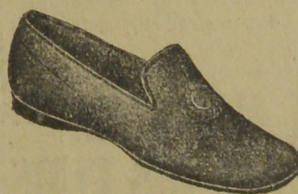
