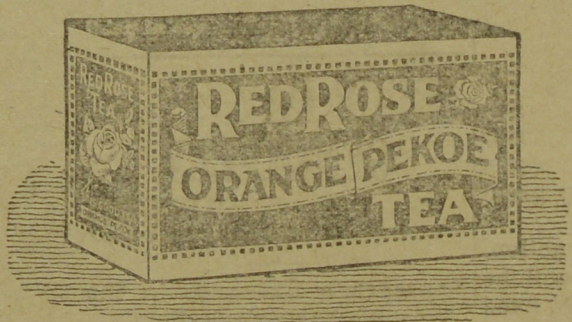

WON'T LOAD ANTI-BOLSHEVİK MUNITIONS

London, May 15—The London dockers have decided to take drastic action with regard to the shipment of munitions of war to Poland of "other enemies of Russia" by refusing to load such cargo on boats bound for these destinations.

This action has been precipitated by the refusal of a number of dockers engaged in loading airplanes and guns upon the Jolly George, a tramp steamer of 900 tons, now lying in the East India dock, to continue such work "on the ground that the cargo was bound for Poland for use against the Bolsheviks."

TO IMPROVE ANGLO-AMERICAN RELATIONS

London, May 15—Dr. A. E. Garvin, the new Chairman of the Congregational Union, will visit the United States shortly on an Anglo-American friendship mission. He will travel in America on a speech-making tour.

He said today that by reason of

their common religious and moral ideals the United States and the British Empire stand at the forefront of human progress. It would be an unequalled loss for each nation to stand alone, since united they can do more than any other of the nations to secure world-wide conditions which will make practicable a realization of the ideal of Anglo-American friendship, which is desired for the sake of mankind.

Mankind does not desire a self-enclosed, self-assertive British Empire.

VALGER IS REGARDED AS COMING BOXER

"French Flash" Has Record of Victories Over Many Noted Boxers—Kilbane One of Them.

Toronto Globe: When Benny Valger appears here on Monday night at the Arena under United Veterans' auspices, with Young Michaels, of Syracuse, as his opponent, Toronto worshippers at Pistiana's shrine will see in action a boxer who is acclaimed by many as the next featherweight champion. In an eight-round bout at Newark the French Flash handed out a trouncing to Kilbane, and in the seventh and eighth rounds had Johnnie hanging on to save himself from a knockout. Valger has a wonderful record. He has taken the measure of such sterling performers as Joey Fox, Johnny Dundee, Matt Brock, Frankie Britt, Frankie Brown, Johnnie Drumme, Cal Delaney, Young Chaney, Jabez White and several others too numerous to mention.

Valger will finish his training for the bout at one of the local clubs.

Young Montreal, who boxes Bobby Eber for the Canadian bantam title on the same night is also expected to put on the finishing touches on his important engagement here. On the strength of his referee's decision over Jack Sharkey, "Montreal" is likely to be made favorite over the belt-holder.

JIMMY WILDE AFTER TITLE AS BANTAMWEIGHT

New York, May 15—Jimmy Wilde world's flyweight champion, will seek the bantamweight-crown next fall.

"I have been approached several times recently about a bout with Pete Herman for the bantamweight championship, and I'm willing, if I don't have to give away too much weight," the little Welshman said today.

Wilde said that Tex Rickard, acting presumably as the matchmaker for the International Sporting Club, had been talking to him about the match.

"I'll box anybody in the world up to 116 pounds," he said. "If Herman will come in around that mark, I'll meet him any time."

It is thought that the Wilde-Herman battle over the fifteen-round route is one of the major attractions being planned for this city when the new Walker Boxing Bill become effective.

Wilde will go back to England in June, but is to return in the fall.
