ALLIANCE EXECUTIVE WILL MAKE ALL PREPARATIONS

Organization for Provincial Prohibition Referendum Early in July to be Extended and Completed—Chief Inspector Wilson Endorsed—Sessions Not Open to the Public—Local Organization for Each Polling District Urged.

The New Brunswick Temperance Alliance was in session here both morning and afternoon Tuesday completing its business and adjourning. The morning session was devoted entirely to the presentation and consideration of the report of the executive touching upon matter connected with the recent vote in the Legislature. In the afternoon there were some interesting discussions and opinion on some matters differed. A number of resolutions embodying the sense of the meeting were passed.

Sessions Not Public.

The announcement that the sessions were open to the public was not official and was incorrect. Press representatives who went on the understanding that the sessions were open were informed that such was not the case and the report of the proceedings was handed out by the secretary Rev. Mr. Boothroyd.

Advertisements to the effect that any persons, even those opposed to Prohibition, were at liberty to attend the sessions had been issued but the majority of the members took the view that the meeting was a private one for those interested particularly in the Prohibition movement.

Preparing For Campaign.

Optimism was the key-note of the meeting all expressing the opinion that Prohibition would carry by a big majority when the referendum should be held. The executive was given instructions to arrange in every way for organization. A story published a short time ago to the effect that \$30,000 was to be raised for campaign purposes of the Alliance was a mere guess with no basis in fact according to the information given officially.

Resolutions Passed.

Resolutions were passed as follows:

1. That the executive be instructed to take all necessary steps to organize thoroughly the different polling sections of the province.

2. That full authority be given the executive to provide all necessary help in organization work so as to insure the success of the referendum.

3. That as far as possible each locality be urged to look after the organization of their own polling district, the Executive standing ready to supply all necessary help in organization so as to secure the success of the referendum vote.

4. That arrangements be made for an extensive plan of publication in the different newspapers of the province and for the providing of necessary campaign literature for distribution.

5. In view of the manifest blessings moral and material, which have attended such measure of Prohibition of strong drink as has been granted us, also in view of the repeatedly expressed wishes of a majority of the citizens of the country, and in view of the stringent prohibitory laws now in force in the United States of America, this Alliance feels justified in calling upon the governments of Canada and of this Province to adopt the most vigorous laws within their several jurisdictions forbidding all traffic in strong drink for beverage purposes and to enforce thoroughly all such laws.

6. This Alliance would once again record its appreciation of the same and judicious efforts of Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson in the very difficult and arduous task in which he is engaged and would hereby express the utmost confidence in him and pledge him our strongest support in his work.
