SUGAR BEETS

A recent bulletin by the Department of Trade and Commerce on the sugar industry in Canada states that 204,017 tons of sugar beets were used in sugar manufacture in 1918. The cost of the beets at the works was \$2,593,715, or \$12.22 per ton.

In 1918, Canada had 18,000 acres in sugar beets, which yielded 10 tons per acre, at a value of \$10.25 per ton. In 1919, the acreage was increased to 24,500, the yield averaged 9.80 tons per acre, and the price advanced to \$10.85 per ton.

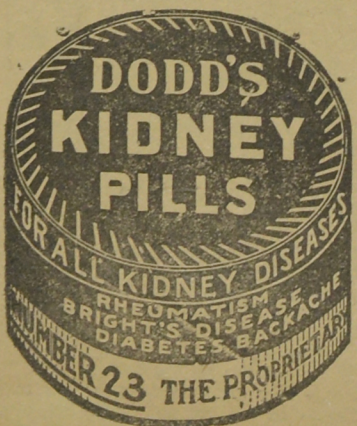
In 1919, sugar was approximately 11 cents per pound; at present, granulated sugar is 23 cents per pound and may be higher. The enormous demand for sugar and the fact that Europe will not for some years produce anything approaching her pre-war quota of sugar beets, promises to continue a serious shortage in the world supply.

Conditions in the beet-growing countries of Europe have materially changed since the close of the war. Previously, large holders of land devoted much of the acreage to beets. The large estates in Russia, Poland, Hungary and many parts of Germany have been in many cases broken up into small holdings, which will be used by the new owners for growing other crops. The small farmers are not so well equipped with implements and tools, and the lack of fertilizers is also being severely felt. These conditions will have a serious bearing upon the production. There thus appears to be a good opportunity for Canada to again this year largely increase the average yield devoted to this crop. A by-product in the manufacture of beet sugar is the residue known as beet pulp. When mixed with residual molasses, a by-product of the refining process, this beet pulp makes an excellent cattle food.

FORTUNES BREAK UP

The assault on the \$100,000,000 estate of Marshall Field reminds one, says an American exchange, that it is rather difficult for a rich man to die nowadays and leave his fortune impregnable. Unsuspected widows show up, dissatisfied heirs risk what they have been left upon the chance of getting more, courts find faults and flaws in most carefully written wills. Then there is the growing popularity of inheritance taxes. The federal government takes from one to twenty-five per cent of an estate as a whole, all the states except three exact a share, small or great. It is becoming a practice to avoid contests and taxes by leaving property in trust, yet this is not altogether lawsuit-proof and we have no doubt the lawmakers will finally succeed completely in defeating it as a feature of tax avoidance. We seem to be seeing the development of a principle wherein it is held best to distribute great accumulations of money among many rather than few heirs, to give to the state ever larger and larger divisions of the money a man may not take with him into the hereafter.

The local graft organ appears to be sore on St. John opposition politicians for allowing Hon. Dr. Roberts to be returned unopposed in the late by-election. On the day following the recent convention it took a slam at them editorially and to make sure that they would see the article had it telegraphed to the Globe, with the explanation that it voiced "Conservative sentiments in Central and Northern New Brunswick". The Conservative sentiment which the organ now voices is limited to Mr. B. Frank Smith who opened the St. John constituency but the opposition failed to come to the scratch. The result is that Hon. Dr. Roberts, the Minister of Health scored a bloodless victory.

The opportunity to do something came when the government is the only Tory politician of note who stands for an occasional holdup. Want Earlier Session

There appears to be a growing demand among rural members of the commons that parliament meet earlier than has been the custom in past sessions, and wind up its business before May 1. Farmer members protest that when the session starts at the end of February, as it did this year, they are compelled to remain away from their farms throughout seeding the most important season of the year for them, whereas during the winter, while there is little or no work to be done at home, they cannot give their attention to the affairs of the country because the house is not then in session.

Several members have spoken privately of a desire to have the house meet at the latter end of October or early in November and then sit through the winter months concluding in April. This would probably mean a two-week's holiday over Christmas and New Years days, but they maintain that the business of the country would be better attended to with winter sessions.

City members, on the other hand, it is said, and particularly those of the legal profession, favor the later sessions because most of their heavy court work has finished before the house opens in the late February or early March.
