BURT'S CORNER ONE OF YORK COUNTY'S THRIVING COMMUNITIES

Recently Visited by a Representative of the Daily Mail—E. Burt Lumer Company Employs a Large Crew and Gives Its Members Excellent Accommodation—Fine Farms in Vicinity With Business Taken Care of by Several Stores.

A motor trip to Burt's Corner at this time of year is worth taking on account of the scenery alone. A representative of the Daily Mail had the pleasure of taking the trip one day last week leaving Fredericton at 5.50 a. m. and reaching Burt's Corner at 6.40—just in time for breakfast at the Mill Hotel where thirty-six men board daily, eighteen of whom also lodge on premises of the E. Burt Lumer Co. Chas. E. Wilcox of Fredericton, who for twenty years was cook at the Douglas Boom, is chief cook for the Company at Burt's Corner. Mr. Wilcox is the "right man in the right place" and knows the cooking game from start to finish. He sets a fine table at all times.

Chief Industry

Burt's Corner on Cardigan, to give the place its railway name, is a hustling place. The large mill which saws lath, shingles and other lumber, employs about sixty-five men, a large number of whom live in the village with their families and are very happy and prosperous. Roy Burt who is manager of the Mill lives in Fredericton making the round trip every day by auto. He is a hustler and very popular among the men with whom he works. He is always on the job. The weekly pay roll at the mill is in the vicinity of one thousand dollars, thus keeping lots of money in circulation.

Places of Business

Last month the United Farmers Co-operative Limited opened a store in the stand formerly occupied by Beverley Lawrence, the popular post master. Campbell Jewett is in charge of the new store and states that business is good although only opened a few weeks ago. Besides the Farmers' store there are several other up-to-date stores all doing a good share of trade.

Burt's Corner Band

Burt's Corner can also boast of a fine brass band consisting of twenty pieces and is under the leadership of James White of Fredericton, who is bringing the band along nicely. This organization gave its first open air concert last Saturday night, and the excellent music was highly appreciated by the large crowd which turned out. The only thing that was lacking was an up-to-date band stand in the open.

Other Features

A good school, several churches, two public halls, a blacksmith shop, a work shop and a splendid hotel, conducted by Harry Allen, are among the noticeable features of this pretty little village. A number of well kept gardens add much to the appearance of the place.

Agricultural Features

There are several well-to-do farmers at Burt's Corner who have been very successful in their chosen occupations. One farm which the Mail representative had the honor of visiting was that owned and operated by Robert Currie. This farm contains two hundred acres, fifty of which are cleared and under cultivation, twenty five in hay and the rest in roots and grain. Mr. Currie has fourteen sheep, fifteen head of cattle, two heavy horses and an auto besides all the up-to-date and latest improved farm machinery. He also has a saw mill on his premises which employs quite a number of men. The Currie farm is a nice one, his brother John on one side and Andrew on the other, also have fine farms and very home like and comfortable farm houses.

AVIATOR PRAISES FARM LOAN PLAN

Lieutenant Leonard B. Curtis, of the Royal Flying Corps, is taking up a fruit ranch in the Kootenay Valley, B. C. New York recently he told the papers there that Canada was doing very decently by the returned men and the story is published in the Montreal Gazette under a New York date line as follows:

"While the American congress wrangles and squirms between the vote-getting advantages and disadvantages of its soldier bonus bill, American war veterans are casting envious eyes toward Canada and her soldier loan-bonus legislation. The one great argument for soldier compensation here has been from the outset 'Look at what Canada and Australia have done,' and this sentiment continues to grow in volume. None of the American veterans have so far been heard to say 'Look at what the Canucks and Anzacs did' to merit their reward, but his is human nature.

"To make things worse, to rub it in, you might say a Canadian soldier comes down here and gloats over it all. This man, Lieutenant Leonard B. Curtis, a native of England, served in the great war with distinction, first as an instructor in Canada, and then as a bomber in Squad 206 in France, until during a raid over Mannheim, he was put out of commission, losing a thumb and suffering wounds in his limbs and body that kept him in a hospital for a year but brought the decoration of the Flying Corps. He is going to Kootenay Valley, B. C. to raise apples. He outlined the Dominion's plan in detail, and said:

"You know the Government does very decently by us chaps. It gives us a cent-a-mile railroad ticket from where we are discharged to wherever we elect to take up a claim. Here's mine, and I use it Saturday. The grant of land I get will nearly be a pure gift, for my pension money, £52.10s, that I will get for the rest of my life, will just nicely pay the interest on my loan. Long before the twenty-five years roll around, when the loan must be made good, I hope to have it paid off by the profits made on the crops."

"Lieut. Curtis planned to take up a few acres in what is described as the 'best apple country in the world'. He has been advised to go in for fruit land as a good investment and may take about four acres with trees already flourishing on them. This land is worth now \$1,000 an acre. 'The apples they raise out there take all the prizes, you know' said he Lieutenant.
