## NO SMOKING PLUMBERS

Denver, June 8—Denver plumbers receiving \$12 a day must keep busy and can not woo Lady Nicotine while on the job, according to a ruling by Judge George W. Dunn.

## MR. A. C. M. LAWSON GIVES HIS VIEWS ON COMING REFERENDUM

To the Editor of The Mail:

Sir,—Recently in your columns I asked regarding the verdict of the jury in the coming referendum. May I now be permitted to state the charge regarding the liquor traffic and submit some evidence.

The traffic in alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes is and has been a bitter, blighting, damning curse on everything pure, decent and virtuous. Its history shows it to be the enemy of law, order, morality, Christianity and civilization. It is responsible for most of the pauperism and crime of the countries in which it has been allowed to operate either directly or indirectly. It is the hot-bed where outlaws begin their career and the cradle where vice is rocked. It has made the slums of our cities and keeps them as they are. It has ruined more than famine, war and pestilence.

The temperance people of New Brunswick submit the foregoing indictment and they ask the opponents of prohibition who are those who represent the liquor interest, to plead. Is the charge true or is it a lie? It will not do for the opponents of our "intoxicating liquor act of 1916" to say that we temperance people are fanatics, hypocrites and cranks; to say "If I don't sell or drink, some other

fellow will"; "If you say I shall not sell, I will sell in spite of the law"; or "If the Province will give me a license to sell, I will pay into the treasury a part of what I make out of my sales."

Let us compare the traffic and other trades. A principle of political economy backs up the statement that "without making it, receiving it as a gift or inheriting it, anyone who obtains wealth is a thief." Some people practice what they call sharpness and lie to a person in a business transaction, but it is only a form of stealing. Take the profession of preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the school teaching profession, the blacksmith trade, the legal profession, millinery or dressmaking and the finished product in each case will lead us to conclude that each representation gives fair or good returns for the money received. Take the keeper of the saloon and let us look at the finished product

The rum-seller toils mightily little, he spins and allows spun, many obscene and objectionable yarns and yet he makes more money with less brains and capital than any other tradesman. What does the rum shop manufacture? The keeper of the rum shop is the maker of drunkards as much as a man who makes shoes is a shoemaker. We see a piece of work nearly finished sitting on the curb-stone or lying in the gutter and we ask, "Whose job is this?" Will the drunkard-maker come out of his factory and tell us "I worked on that job. Look at that face, mouth and nose. He once had a face to be proud of but I am making some changes." No, he would not acknowledge it and try to defend and recommend his work for it is indefensible. You can't separate a workman from his chips. If the liquor business is respectable its products must be respectable.

When a country licenses the sale of booze it enters into partnership with ruining our boys, girls and their parents. When a country by its parliament, prohibits the traffic, it protects the boys, girls and parents and from the standpoint of law closes the factory that makes drunkards and if drunkards are then made, the drunk-

## VETS WANT A REFUND

London, Ont., June 7—It is understood that war veterans who live in rented houses will ask the city to pay over to them the taxes paid by the landlords on such homes, the argument being that the city now exempts from taxation the houses owned by veterans, thus discriminating against the man who is unable to purchase a place to live in. Exemptions to soldiers total \$15,000 in taxes, and if the new proposal is agreed to it will make the amount about \$50,000 per annum.

There are not wanting signs that he might find it necessary to go to England this year if he remains Premier, but as yet there has been no discussion along these lines.

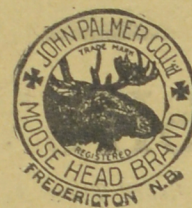
The velvet is in three colors—gray, fawn and brown. The price of a pair of velvet trousers will be about \$6.

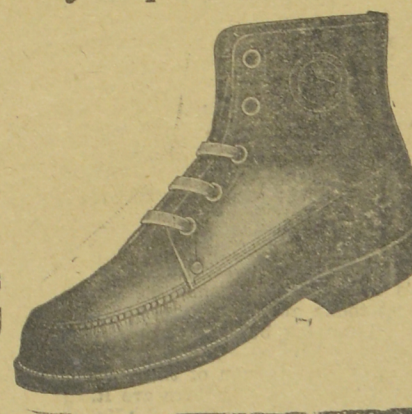
