"A plumber who charges \$12 a day nas no right to smoke on the job," the judge declared in handing down a lecision in the suit of a local plumbing firm against Mrs. F. H. Wood to ecover a bill for plumbers' services.

Mrs. Wood stated that the plumbers who performed the work smoked on the job continuously and spent much of his ime refilling and lighting his pipe. She also alleged that he ruined the woodwork wth tobacco juice.

Judge Dunn, in awarding Mrs. Wood her requested reduction in the bill, remarked

"The evidence shows that the plumber killed time on the job. When a man charges \$12 a day he ought to do his smoking at the noon hour. Certainly he has no right to take such valuable time to fill and light his pipe."

London, Ont., June 7-It is under stood that war veterans who live in rented houses will ask the city to pay over to them the taxes paid by the landlords on such homes, the argument being that the city now exempts from taxeties the city now exempts. from taxation the houses owned by veterans, thus discriminating against the man who is unable to purchase a place to live in. Exemptions to soldiers total \$15,000 in taxes, and if the new proposal is agreed to it will make the amount/about \$50,000 per annum.


