## STORMY SCENE AT TRIAL OF LARKIN IRISH LEADER

Prisoner Conducted His Own Case and Strenuously Objected to Interruptions by the Presiding Judge at New York—Was Finally Ordered by the Judge to be Locked Up in the Tombs Until the Trial was Over.

New York, April 22.—Stormy court scenes which have accompanied the trial of James Larkin, Irish leader, charged with criminal anarchy, were not lacking today.

Conducting his own case, Larkin objected strenuously to "interruptions" by Supreme Court Justice Weeks, and a clash came during Larkin's examination of George R. Lovatt, a former member of the Winnipeg police force, who was being questioned concerning the general strike in that city last year.

Justice Weeks inquired concerning the relevancy of a certain question and at the same time Assistant District Attorney Rorke entered an objection.

"I cannot prove my point if the court and the district attorney desire to obscure with meaningless interruptions the intercourse of thought between the defendant and the witness," began Larkin. "I have a right to—"

Justice Weeks' gavel descended. "You have no right to say the court is trying to obscure anything in this case," said the judge.

"I respectfully suggest right here now, you are doing so, and the penalty you can administer," retorted Larkin.

"This is a direct insult to the court," declared Justice Weeks, "and must be severely dealt with."

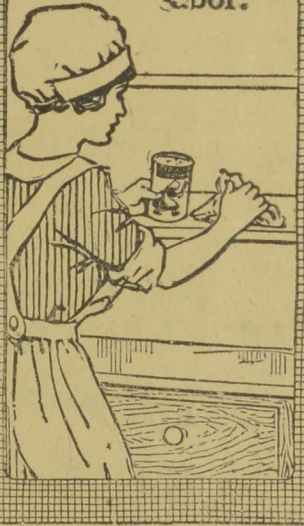
Excusing the jury, he called Larkin to the bench and told him that his language was unjust and unfair and that it called for severe punishment. He then directed a deputy sheriff to see that the defendant was imprisoned during the rest of the trial. He was taken immediately to the Tombs.

## MUST SHOUT FOR LAURIER

Toronto, Ont., April 22.—A well known Ontario man who was an ardent admirer of the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier and whose will has just been probated outside of Toronto, made certain bequests to his brother with a proviso that the brother should attend on his verandah every twenty-fourth of May and shout, "Hurrah for Laurier and reciprocity."

Notice of the event must be posted in the post office on the 23rd of May each year, according to the terms of the will. Following is the clause in the will bearing on the matter:

"I also give to my said brother all of my office furniture and appliances, including my iron safe, typewriter, cabinets, stamp and other appliances and books. I also give him all boats or canoes and all scrap books of a literary nature on condition, that he shall, on each twenty-fourth day of May at noon, in each and every year, stand out on the front platform or walk to his place of residence and shout out loud the words, "Hurrah for Laurier and reciprocity," unless he shall be incapacitated thereto by ill-health or feebleness, notice thereof to be posted the day previous in the post office where he lives."

## TO BOYCOTT EXPENSIVE FRIPPERIES

Detroit, April 23.—Feminine commonsense has declared a boycott on feminine vanity. The frills so dear to her had become prohibitively dear for her.

Women stenographers bookkeepers and office workers of the city at a meeting at the Hotel Statler established the maximum price they would pay for certain wearing apparel and unanimously pledged themselves to limit their expenditures to the price fixed until prices are reduced.

A resolution adopted by the women provides for an investigation into conditions surrounding increases in the cost of clothing. "When these prices are found unjustifiable" the resolution reads, "we shall request United States Grand Jury action and insist that proper legal proceedings be taken to curb those heartless profit hogs in their wild scramble for gain."

The resolution binds the women to confine themselves in the purchase of clothing to the following maximum prices:

Hats, \$10; suits, \$50; shoes, \$10, coats, \$50, dresses \$35; hose, \$2.50; gloves, \$2.

"The prices of women's wearing apparel have become almost prohibitive said Stella E. Geamer, President of the association, which has 890 members and received 127 new applications Monday night, "and apparently nothing is being done to combat such high prices."
