

# A THOUSAND GUESTS AT SWELL NEW YORK WEDDING

**Miss Flora Payne Whitney Becomes the Bride of Mr. Roderick Tower—The Ceremony was Performed at St. Bartholomew's Church in the Presence of a Big Turnout of New York Society—The Decorations and Costumes.**

New York, April 20—Amid decorations that were unique with a bridal party that was unlike that customarily selected by a bride, Miss Flora Payne Whitney, elder daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney and granddaughter of Mrs. Vanderbilt and the late William C. Whitney was married yesterday in St. Bartholomew's church by the Rev. Dr. Leighton Tower, the rector to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Tower son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Tower of Philadelphia. More than a thousand guests from New York and Philadelphia attended the ceremony and many of them went later to the reception in Mr. and Mrs. Whitney's home, 871 Fifth avenue.

Mr. Tower and his bride will pass part of their honeymoon in travel through the West in a private car. Their trip for which they have not arranged a definite itinerary, may take them to the Pacific coast. They also have not decided definitely on their future residence. Mr. and Mrs. Whitney expect to have them for a part of the summer at their country places on Long Island and in Newport.

In addition to being one of the most notable incidents in society this spring the wedding was one of unusually beautiful appointments and in two particulars was unlike any other incident of the kind the guests could

recall. The decorations marked a departure from the accepted idea. The bride dispensed with the bridesmaids and surrounded herself with a group of her small relatives as flower girls and a page.

## Trees of Easter Lilies.

Mrs. Whitney designed the decorations in the church with an art nouveau idea that set a new standard. Placed at intervals at right and left of the nave of the church were twelve flat formal trees ten feet high composed of Easter lilies upon a green background, so placed as not to obstruct the view of the altar. From the entrance the formal trees formed a vista of green and white. Viewed from the side the fanlike tops of the trees formed an almost continuous line of formal tree tops.

The eye followed the vista to a larger tree of lilies and leaves above the altar with its circular top and flat base set above the reredos. The altar tree was the central point of an impressionistic wedding decoration. There was less formality in the groves of palms and Easter lilies at either side of the chancel while the chancel floor was transformed roses, with a central plot just large enough to accommodate the clergyman and the wedding party. More than 15,000 Easter lilies were used in carrying out

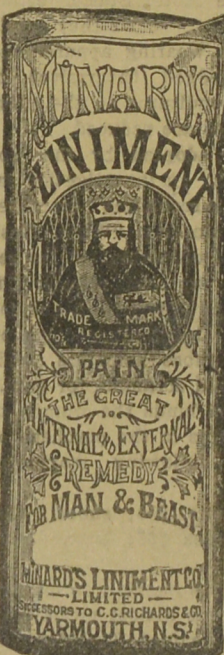
that unique wedding decoration. The Bride's Attendants.

## Sliced Rhubarb.

This is a delicious preserve, which if properly sealed will keep for a long time developing a richer flavor for it.

3 pounds of rhubarb,  
1 pound of figs,  
3 pounds of sugar,  
1 lemon,  
1 teaspoonful of ginger,  
¼ teaspoonful of cloves,  
¼ teaspoonful of salt.

Do not peel the rhubarb, merely wash and cut into one-inch pieces. Wash and chop the figs fine and put with rhubarb and half of sugar in preserving kettle and let stand overnight. Then boil until clear, and add rest of the sugar, the lemon juice and grated rind and spices. Simmer until thick, then pour into hot sterilized jars and seal.
