Smallpox at Hampton.

St. John Globe: Dr. William Warwick, district medical health officer has returned to the city from Hamphas returned to the city from Hampton village, where he has been investigating a case of smallpox there. Dr. Warwick stated that the patient's daughter had been in the influenza emergency hospital in St. John when a "flu" patient who had been taken off the train had developed smallpox there. This man had been taken immediately to the Isolation Hospital on March 8th. All patients in the emergency hospital were held until three weeks after that event though they weeks after that event though they had recovered. These precautions were more than what are ordinarily followed in case of contacts, but it is thought as there seems to be no other trace that the disease is probably traceable to that source. Dr. Warwick antined in Hampton to which contacts were traceable, but there is only the one case. Considerable vaccinating has been done.
