



Eighteen ripe tomatoes, skinned and cut in small pieces, 3 green peppers, and 1 onion chopped fine, 2 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon mace, 2 tablespoons ground cinnamon, 2 teaspoons allspice teaspoons ground cloves, 1/2 teapoon mustard, 1 teaspoon celery seed teaspoon ginger, 1 teaspoon salt, 21/2 cups vinegar.
