

ADDITIONAL CHARGES UPON ARREARS TAXES

**COLLECTION TO BEGIN
AFTER SEPTEMBER 1ST**

**Extra Charge Not Previously
Imposed—Arrearages \$84,-
000—Collection Will
be Pressed.**

The Finance Committee met last night and considered the matter of collection of taxes in arrears. The decision reached was to allow until Sept. 1st, for the payment of taxes without the addition of extra charges. After that date there will be the addition of one-half percent per month, on each tax bill. Heretofore this provision of the Assessment Act has not been enforced but this year it will be and the enforcement will be to the letter. William Hughes is to be in charge of the collection, and will be active.

Total Increased.

The office of the City Treasurer received \$4,183.50 yesterday in taxes which came by mail, in some cases from far-distant points. This makes a grand total of \$152,574.69 collected under the discount regulation.

Arrearages Are Heavy.

Although the amount taken in by the Treasurer's Office was heavy the largest on record, there also is a heavy total of arrearages. This aggregates \$84,000, the total assessment being \$215,000 with ten per cent added for expenses of collection.

MORE PLANES DUE TO TAKE ON SUPPLIES HERE

**THREE OR FOUR EXPECTED
ON FLIGHT THIS WEEK**

**Gasoline and Oil on the Way
Here—Exact Date of Ar-
rival Here is Not
Known.**

Word has been received by R. D. Jones, the local representative of the Imperial Oil Company from the Air Board at Ottawa, that more planes are to be expected here in the near future, in all probability during this week. Another wire has been received from the head office of his company by Mr. Jones to the effect that eleven barrels of special gasoline and one barrel of Mobile "B" cylinder oil is being shipped to him for the use of the planes. Word has also been received from St. John that the gas and oil is on its way. It is not stated in any of the communications just how many planes are to come but judging from the large amount of fuel that is on its way there will be three or four at least, and if the proportion of excitement created is the same as on the visit of the two planes some weeks ago, there will be little business done in Fredericton on the day of the arrival.


Good Landing Place.

Bert Atherton, the proprietor of the West End Boat Livery took care of the first planes to arrive in Fredericton, and had charge of the attendance of them. In a letter received by him from the Air Board some days later, that Board expressed complete satisfaction with the service, and stated that should any other flying boats stop here he would be commissioned to again take charge of their bunkering. Mr. Atherton has not yet received word of the expected planes but it is altogether likely that he will within the next few days. The St. John River here is an ideal place for the landing of hydroplanes, and the fact that this is a station of the Imperial Oil Co. makes it altogether likely that this city will in the future be a regular port of call for the flyers.

INSURANCE DEPT. HEAD VISITOR IN FREDERICTON

**G. D. FINLAYSON WANTS
PROVINCIAL LEGISLATION**

**Uniformity in Provincial Fire
Insurance Laws Desired,
Also Lessening of Fire
Waste.**

G. D. Finlayson of Ottawa, head of the Insurance Department of the Federal Government, is in Fredericton today in the interest of uniformity of day in the interest of uniformity of provincial insurance legislation. Mr. Finlayson is particularly interested in legislation for the prevention of fire waste. His visit here is connected with that.

Visited Provincial Department

This morning Mr. Finlayson in company with Dr. W. C. Kierstead of the U. N. B. faculty visited a number of the Provincial Departments. He conferred with Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, and with some deputy heads of departments. In the Treasury Department he investigated existing legislation with regard to insurance. This concerns chiefly the licensing and taxation of insurance companies.

Mr. Finlayson urges that New Brunswick should enact legislation for the prevention of fire-waste similar to that in force in other provinces. Nova Scotia passed such legislation at the last session of the legislature. The annual fire-waste in Canada reaches an enormous total and the desire of the Department of Insurance is to have Federal and Provincial authorities cooperate to lessen this tremendous economic loss.

New Brunswick although not possessing fire-waste legislation does possess drastic forest-fire laws which have been severely enforced during the present year.
