One of the most conspicuous and pleasing signs of the times, which now meets one everywhere in Nova Scotia, is abundant evidence of the rapid progress of agriculture. Districts which a generation ago were falling into apparent decay are bloomng like a rose, and are replete with promise. It is the people who have changed-not the land. Nova Scotia was always a goodly country. The people are finding it out and beginning to do their part. It is amazing in view of the facts that even "political farmers" could have been found to oppose the Murray Government in the recent electoral campaign. We do not mean to say that Premier Murray and his administrative colleagues wrought the great change although they have contributed so effectively and willingly to it but that they have been alive to the requirements of the hour. They have hearkened to the awaking voice of the farmers and have done everything possible to comply with its demands.

The College of Agriculture at Truro is perhaps the very greatest of all the public monuments which they have erected. Every practical and "nonpolitical" farmer in Nova Scotia takes off his hat to it. It has taught him and his sons and daughters what farming really means and what its interests and possibilities are. It has given the countryside not only a new lease of life but a conception of the illimitable possibilities for the future. It has imparted vision and imagination to the people both old and young. Those who visit it come away inspired. Those who take its courses become missionaries to spread its gospel-"good news"-far and wide.

A Business Now

"Agricola" won local fame a cenury ago and well deserved it, by eaching the very rudiments of agriculture in Nova Scotia which every ntelligent farmer and farmers's son now not only knows by heart, but puts o daily practice on the land. Farming has become a business, not a lottery or an experiment. The farmers want to learn still more. They are hungry for information and guidance, not from mere theorists, but from practical scientists. They realize that a scientist is not a man of fancy but one of experimental knowledge. They may well do so, for they have been convincingly taught by Principal Cum ming, who has made the Provincial College and Farm at Truro the greatest of Nova Scotia's assets. It is safe to predict not only that it will endure, but that it will become more and more valuable as the years pass.

To our farmers themselves, and not to the politicians, this monument they who got it. To talk of farmers not having due influence in public affairs in view of the facts, is ridiculous. While the farmers were content to follow in the foot-steps of their grandfathers, those whom they elected as their reppresentative, were content that they should do so, because they knew no better. 


