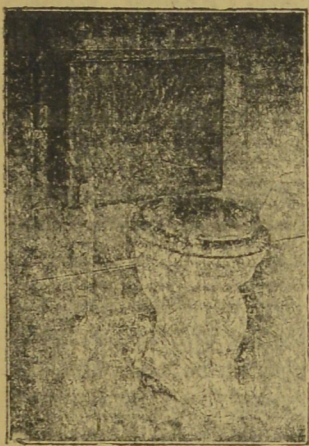

CITY BASEBALL TITLE GOES TO  
Y. M. C. A.—THE IMPERIALS SHUT  
OUT IN SIX GOOD INNINGS

Game Called on Account of Darkness—Imperials Wanted to Go on With the Game—Score 3 to 0—Imps' Infield Errors in Fifth Inning Lost Them the Game—Winning Team Played Errorless Baseball.

The Y. M. C. A. won the City Championship on the Trotting Park diamond last evening shutting the Imperials out in six innings. The score was 3 to 0. J. Walter Walker, Mayor of Marysville was umpire and was entirely satisfactory in his decisions. He called the game on account of darkness at the end of the sixth inning. The Imperials and their followers wanted play to go on but Y. M. C. A. was willing to call the game. The decision was exactly the same as that of Umpire Fraser Hazlett at the College Field in the third game of the series when he called the game with Imperials leading 3 to 1. Y. M. C. A. then wished to continue play.

The Series which was to consist of five games, stands Y. M. C. A. 3, Imperials 1, giving the Scarlet team the title without doubt.

## Good Game Last Evening.

The game last night was about the best of the season and drew the largest attendance. Y. M. C. A. played errorless ball and showed no signs of wobbling. Imperials also were steady until the fatal fifth inning when two errors let batters get on the bases to score on Karl Walker's two-base hit. The one error previous to them did not influence the result. In batting the teams could not have been more even except that Allan Johnson was the big noise on the Imperial team with perfect batting for the game—two singles and a two-base hit. The difference was that Y. M. C. A. hit when the runs would come in and Imperials did not.

The Imps failed to advance more than one base-runner beyond second base and did not steal at all on Y. M. C. A. There was little stealing by the other team Jack Bolster doing all there was.

Both pitchers worked well and Wright deserved much better than to have the infield go bad behind him. He has pitched in hard luck all season.

## The Play.

Imps batted first. Johnson the second man on the order drove out a nice two-bagger and Gas Alley yelled lustily. The yells were a little louder when Boyne sacrificed him but Wheeler was equal to the occasion striking Anderson out. In their half of the inning the Y team got one man on Hayward Paynter hitting safely, but he died there. Imperials started the second well. Boyce was issued a pass, his ability with the stick evidently being feared. Wandless struck out after Boyce was caught stealing by a nice throw by Donovan. Hall was struck by a pitched ball and Lifford drew a pass. Things again looked bright for the Imps but Wright hit to the pitcher and was thrown out. It was one, two, three for Y. M. C. A. and Imps again got going. But the Y players put the brakes on them Johnson singled but put out by the second baseman when Boyne sent out a liner. Anderson singled but with nobody on ahead of him the hit was of little value and Boyce flied out. Y. M. C. A. got Jack Bolster on in the third when George Wandless dropped a fly and he stole all right but that was all there was to it, as the Imperial team tightened up at once. Imperials again looked good in the fourth with a single and a sacrifice at the beginning but the Y. M. C. A. infield was letting nothing through and the rally was nipped short. The Imps did the same in the last half and the fatal fifth inning opened Imperials got the usual hit but

that was all. Y. M. C. A. went to bat and the opposing infield cracked. Davis hit at Hall who muffed just long enough to let the batter get on. Lifford did just the same right afterward letting Kierstead on. The Imperial rooters called on their team to brace up and it did. Williams was fielded out and then Karl Walker won the game with a two-base clout. He has not been noted for hitting this year but did all that was needed last evening. Two runs came in. A passed ball sent Walker to third base and he scored on Jack Bolster's hit. Bolster again stole but the Imperial infield after its lapse was as good as ever and there was no more scoring. The damage was done, however. Only three Imperial batters faced Wheeler in the sixth inning. In this inning Y. M. C. A. got two hits and it looked like more runs but a strike out and an infield fly stopped chances. The game then was called.

## VACCINATION OF EMPLOYES

THE FOLLOWING IS PUBLISHED FOR THE INFORMATION OF THE PUBLIC, GENERALLY, AND ESPECIALLY OF THOSE DIRECTLY CONCERNED

"1. Section 30 of The Public Health Act, 1918," being 8 George V. Chapter 36, is hereby amended by adding after the last paragraph thereof the following paragraph:

No person shall be employed in any camp, ship, factory or other place wherein the employees come at frequent intervals into close and prolonged contact one with another, unless and until such person produces to the employer or the employer's representative a certificate signed by a regularly qualified medical practitioner, of successful vaccination, or a like signed certificate that he is immune to vaccination as proven by three consecutive non-successful vaccinations, or that he is immune to small-pox by reason of having had the disease, and no employer shall employ any person in employment as set forth above, without such certificate being produced. When any person contracts small-pox, who is at the time of the inception of his sickness employed as set out in this section, or who was so employed within fourteen days prior to the inception of his sickness and who has not complied or been required to comply by said employer of employer's representative with the foregoing provisions prior to his employment, then in such case the employer shall be primarily liable to pay all such costs, charges and expenses as the sub-district Board of Health concerned may have incurred in necessarily protecting the public health; provided such charges, costs and expenses were incurred in or about the necessary precautions relative to, or immediately appertaining to, any such case of small-pox, and such costs, charges and expense may be sued for and recovered with costs, in the name of the Chairman of the sub-district Board incurring the same, in any court of competent jurisdiction, within six months of the recovery or death of any such person. Such liability shall be in addition and without prejudice to any liability for any penalty provided for any violation of the provisions of this Act.

The terms and conditions of this section shall not become operative until the first day of July A. D. 1920."

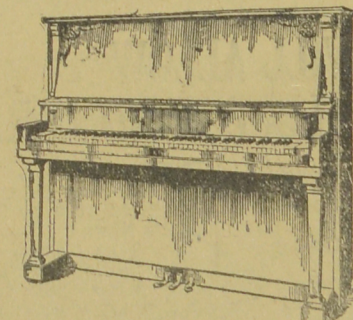
