FALL SUITS.

One of the most striking features of the new suits is the longer coats, which in most cases reach to the knee. This line not only insures greater height, but also gives a warmth which will be appreciated far more in November than can at present be imagined. Some of the models show a noticeable flare, although many box coats are to be worn. With regard to sleeves, no matter how they flare below the elbow, at the shoulder they must fit close and snug. While for the most part they are worn long, for the more dressy suits three-quarter sleeves are decidedly a la mode. Belts are decidedly narrow, and large collars are sure to have quite a vogue, since they are both practical and attractive.

As for skirts, they are determined to remain short—twelve or fourteen inches from the ground is the minimum requirement, and, at least as far as suit skirts are concerned, there is no appreciable increase in their width.

It is the wealth of embroidery, however, which chiefly characterizes these 1920 models. There is really no end to it! No wonder labor is scarce—one would judge that it is all busy embroidering! Most of the embellishment is done in self tones, although many attractive models are embroidered in contrasting shades. Not confining itself to collars and cuffs, the embroidery spreads over coats and skirts, and many costumes take on a decidedly Oriental aspect. A charming little suit of black duvetyn showing this tendency was displayed recently in a Fifth Avenue window. Its chief claim to originality lay in a broad band of silver embroidery extending from just beneath the arms to the scallops which terminated the coat at a point a little below the knees. Narrow scallops also finished the bottom of the skirt and the edge of the slightly flaring sleeves.

The predominance of embroidery is perhaps one reason for the surprising lack of fur trimming to be found in the advance models. Although embroidery is not at all cheap, it at least is far less expensive than mink or sable, to say nothing of rabbit! Then, too, many women have found that separate furs, in our variable climate, are far more serviceable and practical.

Speaking of practicability, some of the new Scotch mixtures and Irish tweeds are all that could be desired, especially for business and sports wear, and an innovation called Twill Luise is sure to appeal to those who look for wear as well as for effect. Broadcloth and duvetyn will both be greatly used, and a new delightfully soft material called Chamoline is sure to prove popular. Cachemire and Patinette are other new materials quite as charming as they sound.

With regard to color, the most popular will probably be brown, which is being featured in shades bearing such picturesque names as "Snuff," "Plover," "Autumn," "Bark," "Sparrow," "Nut," "Bobolink." Black also will be much used, and various shades of dark blue, including "Colonial," "Corbeau," "Dun-querque," and "Admiral," a shade so dark that it seems almost black. "Pine Needle," "Deep Sea" and "Swamp" are varieties of green which undoubtedly will enjoy a great vogue, and a new shade of brown called "Rust" is much in evidence.

FORMER CONSERVATIVE M.P. CALLS FOR AN ELECTION

Mr. J. Ham Burnham, ex-M. P., Says That Premier Meighen Does Not Represent Conservatism—Why Sir Thomas White Would Not Take the Leadership—Present Government Has No Mandate from the People.

To the Editor of The Globe: The Globe attacks Mr. Meighen as the representative of Old Toryism. That may be. He certainly is not the representative of Conservatism. In a manner which has excited the "inextinguishable," if sardonic laughter of those in whom the nation put its trust in 1911 and 1917, he repudiates Conservatism and all other partyisms but his own and "im" Calder's. It was an easy matter for Sir Robert Borden to have notified those behind the Union Government in Canada that the war was over, and that he was about to retire. It was easy to find the six months necessary for a delusory and complete re-establishment of the original elements of Unionism, viz., Conservatism and Liberalism, by new conventions held at Ottawa during the last session of Parliament. Sir Robert knew that Conservatives wished to go back to their time-honored party, which surely has done something for Canada. But, no, Sir Robert resolved to establish a new party for all time on the ruins of the old, and to call it the "Unionist" party. Three separate times did he try, and each time his failure was more pronounced than the last. What might he have been expected to do? Surely, to say: "Well! Since you will not have a permanent Unionism, call a convention and say what you will have." But clearly he was angry. He resolved to have his way in despite of the Conservative rank and file. He hands the reins to Mr. Calder, his prime favorite, and such as he is, and to Mr. Meighen.

Why did not Sir Thomas White assume the leadership? It was on the cards, and he was willing. He would have gladly led the Conservative party and its Conservative tried and true policy of moderate protection approved by the electors again and again. It was from conviction that Sir Thomas White, the most brilliant man in Canadian political history, became a Conservative. With many others he saw the extreme danger that Canada was confronted with. Such a man is in earnest. But, contrary to all expectations, a new combination—the Calder-Meighen combination—came to the fore, and to oblige Mr. Calder the rank and file had to have a new name. So Mr. Meighen obligingly (and patrolling) tells us that we must take a new name and a new line of thought. Was there anything ever more amusing and silly? Like manna from Heaven, a new name and a new etc., is handed down (but by whom?) and new mantles provided for the leaders—leaders chosen and elected by whom? No. The Globe is wrong. Mr. Meighen is Prime Minister by grace of Mr. Calder, but he was not elected by any suffrage to that office, nor was he commissioned by any body but himself and friends to choose a new policy and to wipe out the old party. Meanwhile, let us have an election. Canada First! That is the only issue for a patriot. It is the only thing that will save Canada from political chaos and ruin.

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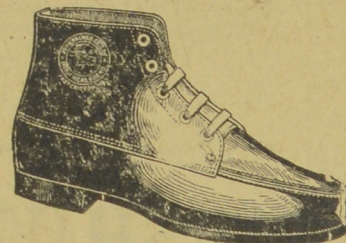

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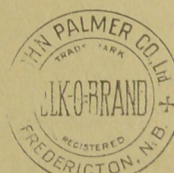
