SUGAR CROP FOR THIS YEAR WILL BE LARGE

(New York Herald.)

Sugar production during the 1920-21 season will be with one exception the largest on record. The yield of the coming world crop is forecast at 17,085,500 tons in all countries, compared with the world's record crop of 18,667,399 tons in the 1913-14 campaign. After five years of short crops and difficult transport conditions nearly every one of the sugar producing countries is having more difficulty than ever in converting the staple into currency.

Cuba is in the midst of a moratorium and business is being done mostly for cash. Yet the crop coming forward will amount to about 4,000,000 tons, surpassing the yield early this year by more than 250,000 tons. Brazil has been experiencing financial difficulties although her sugar crop will be 300,000 tons, almost double the last previous yield. Germany will more than double her 1920 crop with an estimated 1921 production of 4,150,000 tons.

Czecho-Slovakia started off this year with a brilliant prospect ahead for sugar sales and did well with her 1920 crop of 535,000 tons until the heavy slump in European exchanges. Her 1921 crop will total more than 650,000 tons, but, as in the other cases, the wide fluctuations in exchange have hindered selling futures for export. The Government will create a fund to stabilize exchange by pooling profits on all sales above 257,500 tons. An attempt will be made to create a reserve of 1,000,000,000 crowns.

Rubber coffee and many other staple products have slumped, but the producers have had war profits to aid them. Sugar prices were fixed during the war and the consumption was limited by lack of transport. The one product countries depending on this article participated to a limited extent in war prosperity, although Cuba was a notable exception, her situation having been especially favorable.

But all the sugar producing countries were stimulated by the high prices of last spring and summer. As with cotton, however, the demand for sugar was not great enough to keep up inflated prices. Sugar producers deem the inevitable hardships they are going through an ill reward for their efforts to increase production and relieve a world shortage. Consumers do not feel so unhappy.

SIR ROBERT TO THE BENCH

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—Sir Robert Borden, former Prime Minister, will spend the winter in Ottawa and will take his seat in parliament as a private member for the coming session. During the winter Sir Robert is to deliver a course of lectures on constitutional subjects at the University of Toronto.

There is a good deal of speculation as to Sir Robert's future, but the impression which strongly prevails is that he will ultimately replace Sir Louis Davies, as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada. Sir Louis is seventy-five years of age and in September next will complete twenty years on the bench. Under the act a judge of his age who had served for twenty years may retire on full salary as superannuation.

EGG PRICES ARE STEADY

Ottawa, Nov. 22.—The Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, reports the egg situation as follows: Toronto specials, jobbing 85c. to 90c., extras 70c. to 75c., rsts. 65c.; seconds 50c. to 55c. On the farmers market specials are retailing at \$1 to \$1.02. Montreal, firm; specials scarce at 85c. to 90c.; extras 70c.; firsts 62c., seconds 52c. to 55c. Chicago current firsts 70c. to 75c.; refrigerator firsts 52c. to 53c.; extras, 53c. to 54c. New York, fresh unchanged; refrigerators, fancy 59c.; first 56½c. to 58c.

MARRIED ON MONUMENT

Washington, D. C., Nov. 26.—Robert Lee Campbell and Miss Abbie Lee Thomas were married at the top of the Washington Monument before a throng of tourists.

Next probably in point of high speed wooing was the case of a couple in India who became husband and wife less than half an hour after they had first been introduced.

Even the length of Jacob's waiting, says a writer, paled before the case of an English couple living in the lake district. The girl, although engaged while very young, positively declined to marry during the lifetime of her mother.

Fifty years later the mother was still alive. The engagement, however, continued, and the couple remained devoted to one another despite the passage of time. 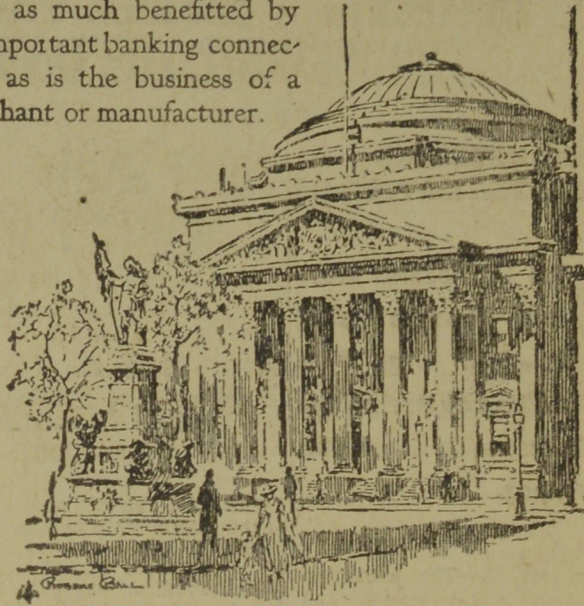

New York, Nov. 26.—The wholesale price of refined sugar has been reduced to 8½ cents per pound. This announcement was made by the Federal Sugar Refining Co. The previous low price was 9 cents per pound.

It was announced that the big western beet sugar companies are withdrawing from the market. The Amalgamated Sugar Company has withdrawn from the market entirely, and the Great Western Sugar Company has withdrawn from the market in territory east of the Mississippi River.
