MONCTON YOUNG MEN ARE PLACED UNDER ARREST

Charged With Stealing Letters from the Post Office—The T. Eaton Company Among the Victims—Evidence Taken in the Police Court—One of the Accused Makes a Confession to Opening Letters.

Moncton, Nov. 26—Further evidence was given this afternoon in the police court in connection with the alleged disappearance of letters and articles from the mails here, the accused being former employees of the Moncton post office. In addition to Willard Dow, arrested in St. John, and William Palmer, previously mentioned, Harold Jamieson and Lawson Stewart have been arrested. Including Romeo Landry, who recently pleaded guilty to opening letters this makes a total of five arrested in connection with the disappearance of mails here. In the police court this afternoon Dow took the stand again. Cross-examined by James C. Sherrin, appearing for Palmer, the witness told of opening several letters one Sunday evening, the property of The T. Eaton Co., Ltd. In some letters, witness said, there was a quantity of money. Several envelopes etc., were palmed in witness' pocket and Palmer's pocket.

Dow testified that he took a quantity of silverware from the post office. The witness testified further as follows: "I didn't make any revelations to any officer until after being arrested. I was away around three weeks before I was arrested." He said he made up his mind in St. John to tell the facts.

"I was told to tell what I knew about it," he continued. "Outside of the Eaton Company letters as far as I know the letters opened were those going out of the city. I don't know where they were going, I was not a party or accessory to the letters until the Eaton letters were opened. I remember opening a few letters. We took a change. We didn't know money was in them."

Robbed Eaton Mail.

"Sometimes we opened letters which contained no money. We started on the Eaton letters about five or six weeks ago. I didn't start opening them. I got some goods from Eaton parcels. The silverware was taken from incoming parcels, not to Eaton's. What I had, I still have. I had several articles of silver, tableware (no knives or forks, one butter knife, perhaps a dozen articles for the table. I had some underclothes, pair of boots, only one pair, stockings (two of three

pairs), and a number of other articles."

To George L. Harris—"Mr. Peck told me it would be better for all concerned to admit all."

"Did any person representing the crown ever hold out any inducement to you to lead you to believe immunity would be promised?"

"No."

"When did Mr. Peck make this statement to you?"

"The statement to tell all I knew was made down stairs after I was under arrest."

"Has any person representing the crown made any inducement to you or held out promises of immunity if you told all you knew?" asked Mr. Harris.

"No," replied the witness.

Bail has been granted to Jamieson and Stewart. The case was heard today before Judge Steeves.

George L. Harris appeared for the postal authorities, James Friel, K. C., for Jamieson and James C. Sherrin for Palmer. Dow is represented by Edson E. Peck, a former magistrate of Albert village.
