## AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY IS HARD HIT IN FRANCE

The Days of Too Much Workmen and Too Few Workmen are Numbered—Minister of Labor Reports a Growing Amount of Unemployment—Many Automobile Workmen are Idle in Various Parts of the Country.

Paris, Nov. 27.—The days of too few workers which have been the joy of labor and the despair of employers in France since the armistice seem to be numbered. In a long statement just published by the General Labor Confederation a "disquieting amount of unemployment in various trades" is reported. M. Jourdain, the government Minister of Labor, also reports a growing amount of unemployment. Here is what he told me about it:

"There are two sorts of unemployment reported in numerous trades—partial unemployment and total unemployment. The first exists in several large factories, notably in the north of France, in Alsace and Lorraine where certain industries are idle a day or a day and a half a week. This condition, regrettable as it is, nevertheless does not mean hardship to the workers involved or to their families. They can get along very well on what they earn.

"Total idleness means suffering. And unfortunately it is undeniable that in a certain number of industries notably the automobile manufacturing industry, but also in the industries engaged in the manufacture of shoes, clothing and furniture, there is con-

siderable unemployment. Many workers have been discharged owing to the lack of orders.

"It is impossible to indicate with any degree of accuracy the number of idle workers in the various industries." The Petit Parisien which has made an exhaustive investigation estimates that 30 per cent of the workers in the automobile industry are idle. This has thrown out of work numbers of employees in the trades allied to that of auto building such as carriage building, sheet metal working, etc. The reason for the slump in the auto trade is lack of orders coupled with disastrous competition due to the sale of cars from the various "army stocks."

Next in point of depression comes the clothing industry in which is estimated that from 25 to 30 per cent of the workers are idle. Both men and women's clothing firms are affected many concerns working only thirty-five hours a week. Corset, raincoat and men's collar factories report trade practically at a standstill. Lack of orders again is cited as the reason for this condition, it being believed that buyers of clothing are awaiting lower prices.

The building trade is equally slack. Thirty-two per cent of the foundation workers are reported idle; 39 per cent of the masons; 30 per cent of the car-

### TELLS WHY GERMANY CAN PAY CLAIMS

(Special Correspondence C. A. N. S.) Paris, Nov. 23.—When the subscription list for the new French Loan was opened at Strassburg the French Minister of Finance, M. Marsal, declared that the people might be sure the Government would never waive the claim it had made against Germany, which was guaranteed by the greatest powers of the world. Germany would pay because it could pay, he said, irrespective of the budget and the exchange value of the mark.

A financial crisis, however great, could not destroy the productive power of a country, he emphasized. Germany would always dispose of considerable wealth, mineral and otherwise which the war had not destroyed, he said, and Germany had coal, timber and nitrates. Her labor population, he concluded, had suffered less than the French.

penenters and 10 per cent of the iron workers. Out of 16,000 metal workers 5000 are idle, chiefly fitters, lathe workers etc. Foundry workers are as yet but little affected.

The furniture making trade reports 10,000 cabinet makers out of work, 3000 wood carvers and 1500 chair makers. In the leather tanning industry the situation is still worse. Seventy-five per cent of leather workers in all branches from tanning to finishing are idle it is said.

A shortage of 30 per cent of normal in the production of pottery and china ware is reported and this causes considerable unemployment in the industry. The reason for the slow-up of production is always the same—lack of orders.

## MORAL FACTOR CAUSED DEFEAT OF WRANGEL

London, Nov. 27.—Six weeks ago I gave it as my opinion that despite the conclusion of peace between Poland and Soviet Russia, Gen. Baron Peter Wrangel would be able to maintain himself in the Crimea during the winter, which shows the unwisdom of prophecy concerning war. At least, however, I was in good company, for obviously the French Government would not have recognized Wrangel unless it, too, believed he could maintain himself.

The fact is, the physical element in the situation pointed toward the solidity of Wrangel's situation, but the moral elements were incalculable and, as Napoleon was fond of asserting the moral it to the physical as three to one.

### Rival Forces Lack Cohesion.

The armies on both sides have lacked the cohesion necessary to enable them to meet reserves in fortune, and the chief anxiety of a large number of supporters on both sides has been that they might be with the probable victors. This has been the cause of the very sudden changes which have taken place from the time of Kolchak's first advance down to Wrangel's collapse. Reverses have meant the instantaneous falling off of adherents who, to all appearance up to the moment of the reverses, had been enthusiastic zealous supporters.

Armies are peculiarly susceptible to any movement threatening their flank or rear, so that bold raids often completely and dramatically change situations. In Russia the two sides have not been unlike two football teams which contained some fast runners, but no one who could tackle, with the result that the ball goes rapidly from one end of the ground to the other.

Stretched Left Wing Too Far. In endeavoring to join forces with

the anti-Red forces in the Ukraine he stretched out his left too far, and perhaps it would be fair to say that he counted on receiving more support from the Ukraine than was forthcoming.

I do not believe that the poison gas or the superior fighting qualities of the Bolsheviki had much to do with the result. The main cause of Wrangel's failure was that his troops could not stand the strain of a retreat, and the supporters whom he had taken great pains to conciliate had not the nerve nor the confidence to back him when there was the least danger of his falling.

It is at least probable that Bolshevism will collapse as suddenly and dramatically as have those movements which have attacked it actively, but the course of events has made it as clear as daylight that armed foreign intervention is the best friend of Bolshevism and the surest way of postponing its collapse.

## FLOUR PRICES THE LOWEST IN FOUR YEARS IN UNITED STATES

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 26.—The Northwestern Millers' Weekly Review of the flour market says: "Another sharp drop in wheat, apparently checked by a rally on the 23rd, has carried flour prices to a new low level, with patents ranging from \$8.25 a barrel at the western mills to \$10 in eastern markets, which represents the lowest prices in four years. Even so, there has been little buying as purchasers who have already suffered repeated losses through successive drops in wheat have no confidence that a dollar and a half represents the final low point." The mills continue to run at about half capacity and the output of both flour and feed is smaller than in any preceding November for many years.
