MAKING SHIRTS LAST.

If men's shirts are worn around the neck and the shirt is good elsewhere, you can fix it in the following manner. Cut a piece about eight inches wide from the front of shirt flap on both sides, just below where the buttons and buttonholes stop, replacing these taken pieces with any material as near like it as possible.

Rip back of collar band and shoulder seams on each side and set in the pieces taken from the flaps, matching stripes, or figures, close to the buttonholes and stitch in place. You now have a double yoke on the shirt which will wear fully as long as the shirt.

Do not cut away the worn part, for the shirt is made stronger with the double yoke. If the cuffs wear out first the same idea may be carried out. That is, the bottom of the shirt flap can be used to make new cuffs, following the pattern of the old cuff.

VALUE OF CLEANLINESS.

Filth and dirt do not always cause disease, but generally there is an association. Organic material which is left about becomes even in cold weather, a breeding place for germs. Careless habits of mind and body are cultivated and fostered by careless habits of living.

NO PAY IN SOUL SAVING

New York, Nov. 26—Declaring he was "up against it" because "saving souls was not a lucrative business," the Rev. Robert Rein, 58, street evangelist, today advertised in a Jamaica newspaper for "any kind of honest work to tide over a period of slack times."

Rein, who has a wife and child, has been preaching to street audiences in Jamaica for several months. He has substituted for ministers on vacations and occasionally officiated at marriages and funerals. These sources of income have diminished so, he wrote in explanation of his advertisement, that he was forced to give up an apartment and move with his family into a single room.

The preacher was a bartender in "Hell's Kitchen" and also a concert-hall singer before he became a convert to Christianity 31 years ago.

PRIZE MONEY FOR SEAMEN

Ottawa, Nov. 25—Many checks have been distributed by the Department of the Naval Service for naval prize money to men who have served in the R. C. H. and R. N. C. V. R. As in many cases, however the addresses of the men for whom checks have been issued are not known, it has not been possible to forward all the checks and the department would like to be informed as to the address of any man entitled to prize money, who has not been paid.

The minimum service required to qualify for naval prize money is one month's service in an offensively armed sea-going ship of war, between August 4, 1914, and November 11, 1918. Service in harbor vessels does not count. As the records of the members of the R.N.C.V.R. (overseas division) have not been received claims cannot be dealt with for the present.

LAST OF PARIS CREW

Elijah Ross Dies at St. John aged Seventy Four Years—Member of Famous Crew.

The death of Elijah Ross at his residence, 220 Prince Street, West St. John, occurred this morning at 12.30. He passed away very quietly. He was in his seventy-fifth year and leaves his wife, one daughter, Mrs. W. S. Beatty of 258 Lancaster avenue and a brother George, of DeMonts street, West St. John. The late Mr. Ross was born at Parrsboro, N. S., and removed to St. John when a small child. He was an expert boat-builder and an enthusiastic sportsman.

With the passing of Mr. Ross, who was a member of the Paris crew which had so many victories to its credit, there are now no surviving members of that group of world famous oarsmen.

The Paris crew was composed of Robert Fulton stroke; Elijah Ross, No 3; Samuel Hutton, No. 2; George Price, bow oar. A brother of George Price was spare man. Hutton was drowned in a yacht race in St. John harbor.

Mr. Ross in his rowing days, weighed 158 pounds, was five feet, eleven inches in height and was of powerful muscular development. His whole appearance was that of a trained athlete.

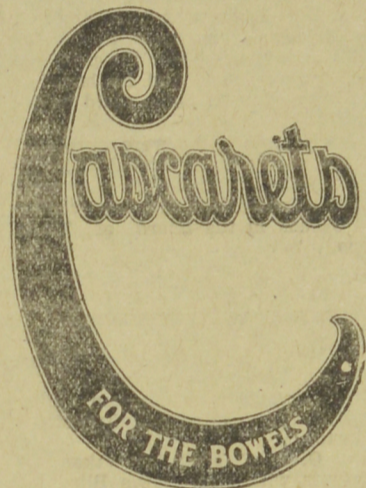
