## ANOTHER RESIGNATION STUNT AT THE CAPITAL

Members of the Board of Commerce Render a Real Service to the Country at Last—Have Resigned Office and No Successors Will Be Appointed—Government Said to Be Pleased Over the Sugar Episode.

Ottawa, Oct. 22—All three members of the board of commerce have resigned. Reasons for this step were given in a letter to Premier Meighen today by the chairman of the board, Captain William White, and it is understood that he spoke as well for the other two commissioners, F. A. Acland, deputy minister of labor, and Major Gerald Dillon. This letter was not made public last night by the premier, when announcing that the members of the board had tendered their resignations except to say that it was "following the decision of the government reversing the order of the board of commerce with regard to sugar."

The premier said that "no appointments to the vacant positions will now be made." He referred to the necessity of awaiting the decision of the judicial committee of the privy council as to the extent of the federal authority in giving the board of commerce been delay in setting the exact date "because the provinces have a right to be heard," and it has been difficult to suit all conveniences.

"When this decision is given," said Premier Meighen, "it will be for the government to decide what should then be done." If by that time the public humor is ripe to endure a funeral of the board of commerce, there is little doubt in any one's mind here but what that will be done.

### Government Pleased

The government is believed to be secretly pleased about the sugar episode because it appears to them to give a suitable opportunity to get rid of an institution which has been a storm centre in the business and political world ever since its establishment. There was the quarrel between Judge Robson, the first chairman, and his fellow commissioners over his correspondence with the Crescent Creamery Company. When Judge Robson resigned there was the failure of the government to appoint a successor, and the ultimate resignation of Messrs O'Connor and Murdoch because they had found their labors a futile

striving against influences which negated their most important decisions. Then came a "stop-gap" board appointed "against their will" to fill in until the privy council decision would give the government a chance to inter the body or force it to make permanent decisions. Captain White who was secretary of the board was appointed chairman, and in resigning that office he still remains secretary of the board of commerce which still exists because it is the result of parliament's labors and can only be finally dispatched by parliament.

It has never really had a chance to show its usefulness, being under a government which never wanted it although having it forced upon them by public demand that something should be done. The retiring members of the board, although evidently intended to mark time, took a more conscientious and vigorous view of their duties. They have attempted to cope with various complaints of profiteering and accusations concerning illegal combines, but they found themselves without proper organization, equipment or backing and with a series of decisions already made which they had to implement. The commissioners take the view that promises made by former commissioners to the sugar refiners had to be made good, and it is whispered here that they are of opinion that sugar prices will soon take a steep upward swing when again they will find it necessary to protect the consumer. At any rate the board of commerce resumes its ill-starred way without chairman or commissioners, and if it ever is presided over again it will be a vastly different body in that its powers and scope of activity will have been altered considerably.

### All Have Quit

merce is no more. Announcement was made from the prime minister's office tonight that the members of the board had tendered their resignations to the government and no appointment to the vacant positions would now be made. The announcement from the prime minister's office followed a series of meeting of cabinet council which was held today the last of them convening at 5.30 this afternoon and lasting for two hours.

The statement issued tonight says that when a decision is given by the judicial committee of the Privy Council, as to the extent of the federal authority in relation to the Board of Commerce Act, "it will be for the government to consider what should then be done."

Premier Meighen's statement does not occasion much surprise in the capital, as it was felt here that the resignations of the members of the board were certain to be handed in following the cabinet's reversal of the boards order with regard to the maximum price of twenty-one cents per pound for sugar.

The three commissioners who have now resigned are Captain William White, who was formerly secretary of the board, and who was appointed a commissioner on the resignations of the original commissioners, F. A. Acland, deputy minister of Labor, and Major G. A. Dillon, purchasing agent for the department of justice. The formal announcement of Captain White's appointment as chief commissioner of the board of commerce is gazetted in this week's Canada Gazette, published tomorrow.

The appointment of the three gentlemen who have now tendered their resignations was stated to be a temporary measure, following the resignations of Judge H. A. Robson, of Winnipeg, the first chairman; W. F. O'Connor, K. C., and James Murdoch, labor representative on the board.

"The jurisdiction of the board will shortly come before the judicial committee of the Privy Council for final determination. The dominion government has been pressing to have this case heard with the least possible delay but as the provinces have a right to be heard it has not yet been possible to have the exact date of the hearing decided on.

"When a decision is given as to the extent of the federal authority in relation to the board of commerce act, it will be for the government to consider what should be done."
