MANY XMAS PRESENTS FOR THE PRESIDENT ELECT

Marion, Ohio, Dec. 28—Seven times seven tabulators reckoning seven weeks scarce could complete the roll of the Christmas presents that have come to the President-elect and Mrs. Harding. For days mail carries have lunched out Mount Vernon avenue bearing whole pouchfuls of holiday gifts. From morning until night express trucks deliver parcels of size all the way from a little finger to a packing box. And none of them has been opened.

But Mr. Burleson's mail persons are not always gentle in their handling of the heavy post, and side glimpses have been caught, from the frayed and rent ends of pasteboard boxes and paper covered packages, of elaborate silk ties (one hand painted), of silk underwear (and what will the common people think of this?), of hats—multitudes, covers herds and flocks of hats—even unto the four quart lid that statesmen must not go without, of cigars by the thousand, some bearing the mail and revenue stamps of the Republic of Cuba, of cigarettes (he smokes 'em now and then from a case made of G. O. P. elephant), of pipes, presumably of the real Irish briar; of silken mufflers and of walking sticks and scarf pins galore.

Then there is the live stock. First came Sam Bell, the 'possum, a diverting young creature from Georgia. He has had the honor, has Samuel, of being fed from Mrs. Harding's own hand. His days are likely to be long in the land, for neither the President-elect nor Mrs. Harding cares for 'possum in the pot. Four turkeys have gobbled proudly over the presumptive distinction of perishing to make a Harding feast, and doubtless more of the strutting fowl are in the express. Ducks, wild ones, wild geese, venison, game of all kinds have been offered to the Hardings for their holiday meal.

Many of the presents, it must be said, have come from dealers in this and that who may have the shrewd

idea of advertising that their wages are being worn by the President of the United States in time to come, but this practical generosity has only a small place in the vertiable deluge of presents. Hundreds of women have remembered Mrs. Harding with odds and ends generally pleasing to the sex—fancy work, lace, charmingly done embroidery, dollies, sofa cushions. Both Mr. and Mrs. Harding would have been at pains to discourage all this if they had thought to anticipate it, but, as the President-elect says, "The country is big, and the people are generous and kind hearted."

The Hardings will spend Christmas eve and Christmas day at home, having their own Christmas distribution of presents and their Christmas dinner with a few personal friends, no fuss and feathers about it. Never having had children, they never followed the customary of decorating a Christmas tree, but they do hang up stockings in the old fashioned way.

The President-elect said laughingly today that he wished somebody would slip into his stocking the answer to about ten questions he could ask of destiny.

WILL STRIKE BLOW AT TRADE OF CANADA

Nearly ten years ago there was a Government and a President in Washington friendly towards Canada and Britain. The commerce between the Republic and the Dominion was large and growing with the certain promise of a development that would amaze the world. In order to encourage the development and to render the conditions more just and fair for both sides, propositions were made by representatives of both Governments which tended towards free interchange of raw materials and the equalizing of duties on certain manufactured articles. A more just, fair and equitable arrangement could not be imagined but the manufacturers, afraid lest they might to some extent lose their strangle hold on their co-patriots at once raised the cry of "wolf! wolf!" The politicians took it up and the people were treated to a campaign of wild denunciation of every thing American, our neighbors being represented as crooks, looters and hold-up men, and the past itself as a deep and subtle scheme for first making Canada the backyard of Chicago and finally bringing this country into the Union before her people knew what was happening. Without a single economic argument against it, the pact was rejected by the Canadian electorate undoubtedly to the great loss of Canada commerce. As long at least as Mr. Taft remained in the Presidential chair the pact was kept on the American statute books with the hope that a Canadian government would some day come into existence and ratify the agreement. But Canadian Toryism remained hopelessly blind and stubborn and the offer remained unaccepted. At length it was repealed and now there is a Government elected to power almost on an Anti-British war cry, and a Tariff bill is ready which constitutes one of the most serious blows which Canadian trade has ever received. On wheat, the duty is 30 cents a bushel, flour 20 per cent, potatoes 25 cents a bushel, onions 40 cents, cattle 30 per cent, sheep two dollars per head, lambs one dollar; and a number of other things in proportion. In addition to this a tariff has been raised demanding an embargo on all imports of Canadian food materials. We do not say that the new tariff is a tariff of revenge for turning down the Reciprocity offer, but it is patent to everybody that had the Reciprocity agreement then been made, Canada would not have had to meet the present blow which may prove a serious one indeed. There is little doubt but that the rejection of Reciprocity was one of the biggest mistakes ever made by this country.

November is past and now it's December. Soon it will be January, then February, March, April and violets. This is optimism.

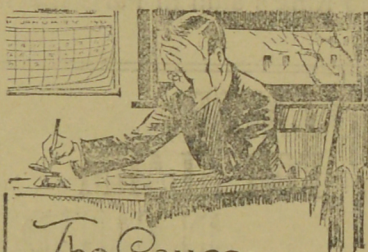
D'ANNUNZIO SURRENDERS

Milna, Dec. 29—D'Annunzio has issued a proclamation declaring that it is not worth while dying for Italy. He said he was leaving Fiume by air plane.

This was semi-officially announced here this afternoon, together with the announcement that the Fiume agreement may be regarded as concluded.

Fiume, Dec. 29—A conference for the purpose of arranging the final cessation of hostilities between the regular Italian forces of General Cavaglia and D'Annunzio's legionaries, was set for this morning. Meanwhile all military operations have been suspended.

General Cavaglia commander of the regular Italian forces, arranged the conditions of peace with a delegation of the council.
